he knew his was not pursuing the practice of the English House.

Some further discussion took place, when the committee rose and the House adjourned.

Cheese-men on Branding.

The Committee on Agriculture and Colonization had a lengthy session in the morning, when a deputation of dairymen and dealers in dairy products from eastern Ontario and Quebec were heard.

The deputation included the following gentlemen: Joseph F. Redmond, president of the Brockville Dairymen's Board of Trade; R. J. Gilroy, Secretary; O. Bush, M.L.A.; R. J. Kelly, C. H. Smith of Chantigny, H. S. Foster of Knowlton, George R. Hodgson and D.A. Macpherson of Montreal.

Mr. Hudson, of Montreal was the first speaker. He said the interests of the Montreal merchants and the factormen were identical in everything concerning the branding of cheese.

With regard to the proposal that the date of make should be branded on all Canadian cheese, which question was the one the deputation were invited to discuss, Mr. Hudson submitted a resolution passed by the cheese shippers of Montreal recently in favor of branding. It would be a handicap or at least a reflection on the Montreal merchants if branding was not adopted.

Joseph F. Redmond, of Brockville said the Brockville Dairymen's Board were as a whole opposed to the branding of the date of make, but were in favor of the branding of the locality in which the cheese was made.

Mr. Bush, M.L.A., was strongly opposed to branding of date of make, and contended the farmers were opposed to it too.

Prof. Robertson, the Dominion Dairy Commissioner, in the whole, was opposed to compulsory branding. He said our cheese should be sold on its merits. He seemed to regard the agitation of branding of date of make as a scheme to enable the English dealers to cut down prices. If branding legislation was passed, he would pay for it through our pocket.

He suggested that the question should be laid over for a year to permit of further information to the public being secured. During the discussion it came out that in certain cases August-made cheese had prior shipment to England, been branded as Montreal last year as September cheese.

Hon. Mr. Angers, Minister of Agriculture, said the object of Parliament must be to protect the producers, not the shippers or dealers. If we branded cheese as July make we would be giving a written evidence against the farmer. Mr. Angers held that the August-made cheese had, prior to shipment of English dealers in Canada, at least ready to be shipped. He called attention to the different climatic conditions in different parts of the country, Ontario, for instance, perhaps making first-class cheese during a month in which a province further west would make an inferior quality.

Before the deputation were received, Mr. Sproule, chairman of the committee, announced that 250 circular letters had been sent out to the cheese factories throughout the Dominion, asking for an opinion on the branding question. Already 245 replies had been received and opened. Of these, 214 were in favor of branding, 16 were against and 9 were doubtful. The committee will meet next Tuesday to further consider the matter.

BRITISH VICE-CONSUL KILLED

AN OUTRAGE FOR WHICH TURKEY MUST ANSWER.

The British Consul, Russian Consul and a French Consul, attacked and dangerously wounded by Bedouins - British Warships sent to Demand Reparation and Protect the Lives of Foreigners.

London, May 31.-A dispatch from Constantinople to The Pall Mall Gazette says: Reports have been received there that the Turkish police recently forced an entrance into the residence of the British, Russian and French delegates at Moosh for the purpose of arresting a servant. The British Consul, the Russian Consul and the French Consul, respectively, were insulted, and the servants of the delegates and otherwise made themselves offensive.

Supposed to Be Bedouins.

Constantinople, May 31.-A party of men, supposed to have been Bedouins, recently attacked in the vicinity of Jeddah, Syria, the British Consul and Vice-Consul, the Russian Consul and the French Consul, respectively, and the British Vice-Consul was shot dead, the Russian Consul seriously wounded and the French Secretary slightly wounded.

Details of the Outrage.

Jeddah, May 31.-Further details of the attack on the British and French Consular party yesterday have been made public. The party had gone out for a walk in the vicinity of the evening had stopped to rest at a point half a mile from the town. While resting the Bedouins, who were armed with a distance of four yards.

Abdur Razzak, the British Vice-Consul, received dangerous wounds in the head and back. He was severely wounded in the arm and back. He was carried to the Russian Consul, and M. O'Rourke, Secretary of the French Consul, received dangerous wounds in their faces, and doubts are expressed as to their recovery. The body of Abdur Razzak showed that he was stabbed at fifteen arrests, he was made.

Warships at Jeddah.

Three British warships have been ordered to Jeddah with instructions to protect the lives of foreigners and to investigate the killing of the British Vice-Consul and the wounding of the other consular officers.

Steamers Collide on Lake Huron.

Alpena, Mich., May 31.-The steamers Norman and Jack were in collision in a dense fog near Middle Island, Lake Huron, last night. The Norman sank, carrying off with her the steward's wife, a watchman and a deck hand. The Jack was damaged at last accounts, but in a badly damaged condition. Her captain, mates and engineer refused to leave her, and are still on the boat. The balance of the crew and that of the Norman took to the lifeboats, and were picked up by the steam-boat Slocan, and landed here.

The Jack is new, and was built and owned by the Calvin Company of Garden Island, near Kingston. She is valued at \$400,000. She is the steamer which carried a reconstruction of the Welland Canal a couple of weeks ago on her first trip on the lakes.

NEWFOUNDLAND FEELS RELIEVED

The Loan Will Take It Over the Financial Difficulties.

St. John's, Nfld., May 31.-As stated in these despatches last night, the Newfoundland Government has obtained a loan of \$250,000 from the Welland Loan Commission, which has been serious financial difficulties which have been confronting it. The loan was secured on the condition that a policy of drastic retrenchment be pursued, and that with a reconstruction of the public service. An expert examination of and report upon the finances of the country will be made. The Government now has \$250,000 above its immediate wants, which will enable it to meet any possible deficits to the end of the year, after which it is expected that the revenue and the money secured through retrenchment will enable the annual expenditure to be met.

There is a general rejoicing over the success of Colonial Secretary Bond in having the loan from Newfoundland, now safe from confederation with Canada, and also from being relegated to the position of a "Crown Colony" if it were not to be re-commenced immediately, and will be prosecuted vigorously. The Government proposes to have its plan of retrenchment on Monday.

Emigration continues. The steamer Slocan, which sailed for Norway and 100 emigrants, although the fishing season has now opened, the resumption of work on the railway may check the tide, but already the flower of the population has left the colony.
