

### OF PASSING INTEREST

We have a right to know what this latest probe into Hydro will cost per kilowatt hour.

That reformer who says all scandal should be made public probably does not know the present price of print paper.

With a proper radio outfit you can keep in touch with the gossip of the world, but we calculate it will be a long time before science replaces the Ladies' Sewing Society in giving 100 per cent. efficiency.

The bill to amend the Ontario Temperance Act contains a clause that any person twice convicted within a period of three months of being intoxicated in a public place, may be committed to jail, or to a jail farm, for a period not exceeding three months.

Prices in 1913 were as follows:—Coal was \$8.00 a ton; bread, 5 cents a loaf; butter, 25 cents a lb.; meat, 20 cents a lb.; tea, 25 cents a lb.; eggs, 20 cents a dozen; sugar 20 lbs. for \$1.00; potatoes, 30 cents a bag, also many other commodities of life far below in price of what they are today. House rent, a good house for \$8 a month.

Word has been received that an order-in-council has just been passed in regard to the catching of suckers and pike. During the months of April and May, in 1922, suckers and pike may be caught with a spear or dip net for home consumption but not for sale or barter without the usual license. This is the first year that this rule has been made.

A monument to Sir Wilfred Laurier will be erected on Parliament Hill in the near future. This statement was made to the House of Commons by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, premier. Mr. King intimated that the general policy which has been pursued in the past in regard to the subject will be continued by the present administration.

Discovery in the River Thames, within the London city limits, of two of the largest and most valuable fresh-water pearls ever found in Canada has inspired many people to go pearl-fishing along that stream. The two gems, valued at \$300 and \$300 respectively, are perfect specimens and came by chance selections from clamshells with which the bed of the river is abundantly strewn.

The new dairy standards Act, which came into force Jan. 1st makes it compulsory for all dairies and creameries to pasteurize their butter milk and whey before they can dispose of it as feed in order to prevent tuberculosis in hogs, and yet despite the warning, mothers will still persist in feeding their babies raw milk. What is the use in trying to stamp out this awful disease if people still remain so blind?

Perfumed cigarettes are passing out of favor with American women. They now demand the same sort of six-cylinder cigarettes, with the full tobacco flavor, that the men smoke, according to Percival Smith Hill, president of the American Tobacco Company. "Women want the same sort of cigarettes as men do," Hill said. "Perfumed cigarettes do not satisfy the educated smoker. Women in the larger cities are smoking more cigarettes than ever."

### TEACHING ENGLISH

A British Government committee on the teaching of English reported that three aims should be kept in view: first, correct pronunciation and clear articulation; second, clear expression in speaking and writing, and third, training in reading. Under the last head it advised reading aloud with feeling and expression, the use of books as sources of information and means of study, and finally the use of literature as a possession and a source of delight, a personal intimacy and the gaining of personal experience, an end in itself and at the same time an equipment for the understanding of life. "English is not the medium of our thought, it is the very stuff and process of it. It is itself the English mind, the element in which we live and work."

Here we have a broad view of teaching the young how to read. It is not merely showing the structure of the language, but imparting a love of literature, and a knowledge of where the best may be found. There is a certain mechanical way of presenting the classics that creates distaste rather than appetite. The test of success is the desire of the student to know more of the author and his work. With this desire, and with a fair knowledge of the highways and byways of literature, he can continue his own education, making the library his college and university.—The Globe


