





Add a layer of pickles and so on antil the mixture is used. Pour over it the vinegar, let it stand two days and it is ready To pickle green tomatoes, slice a peck of them. Put a layer of the tomatoes in a stone jar; place on a layer of sliced tomatoes, add a sprinkling of salt; continue until all the tomatoes and a dozen of sliced onions are used. Let them stand over night. Drain and place in a porcelain kettle with an ounce





Nothing de-The harness should be frequently sponge to remove dirt, and then be oiled, allowing the oil to soak in, and then lightly rubbe with a dry cloth. Kept thus, instead of be coming rotten after one or two years, a har ness may be kept in good condition for from ten to twenty years. We know farmers who have kept harness for this longer time, while other farmers who did no more work with their teams, had to buy a new harness every two or three years. -Do not let an ounce of fertility on th the farm go to waste. Utilize every thing that has in it any elements that will enrich the soil, and take such care of your manure that the best part of them is not lost before they reach your fields. Every farm should have a compost heap, where all sorts of re-fuse from the house, barn and yard can be thrown.
