At length they agreed to " fight out" the dispute in a field, and both rapaired there alone for the purpose. A struggle took place, in the course of which Price got his opponent to the ground, and while in that position stabbed him with a knife. The unfortunate man died soon after, and his murderer escaped. A warrant was issued for the apprehension of the latter, but the police could never find any trace of him until last week, when a man who formerly knew all the parties, hap-pened to be on business at Fleur-de-lys. Here he saw the prisoner, and declared him to be no other than Price, who committed the murder described. Price still retained his name, and been living in the place where he was found ever since the occurrence. 


