Frank has known seven Prime Ministers and countless parliamentarians. All who have had contact with him have been struck by his warm personality, his good humour and his professionalism. He has contributed immensely to the high standards of the Protective Service, standards which no doubt will be maintained for many years to come, a legacy of which he can be justly proud.

Frank Foran has, in over 40 years on Parliament Hill, seen a great deal — and fortunately said little. May many whom he has witnessed over the years continue to count on his discretion!

Allow me, honourable senators, to draw your attention to the gallery and to our distinguished visitor, Sergeant Frank Foran, and his wife Rita, together with many members of their family, and let me express to him, on behalf of members past and present, their great appreciation for his devotion and loyalty, as well as many well-deserved, happy and healthy retirement years surrounded by his loved ones.

Hon. Gildas L. Molgat (Deputy Leader of the Opposition): Honourable senators, I should like to associate myself and all the members on this side of the house, and I trust on this occasion even the new member on this side of the house, with the words expressed by my colleague, the Deputy Leader of the Government.
