HON. DR. MONTAGUE IS WINNER IN BY-ELECTION IN MANITOBA

Minister of Public Works Has Majority of our Hundred in Kildonan and St. Andrew's Constituency Previously

WINNIPEG, Nov. 30.—(Can. Press).—With three polls to hear from, Hon. Dr. Montague, the new provincial minister of public works, has a lead of 370 in Kildonan and St. Andrew's by-election, held yesterday. The figures: Montague, 1123; Bredin, 753; majority, 370.

At the 1910 general elections the figures were as follows: Grain (Conservative), 1131; Bredin (Liberal), 1043; majority, 88. At the last election the three missing polls of Fort Alexander, Bad Throat and Rabbit Point cast a total vote of 64, and gave a Conservative majority of 18. This indicates that final figures, possibly not available for several days, will add slightly to the government majority.

YOUNG BURGLARS CAUGHT WITH THE GOODS

Three Boys Hid for Two Hours in Basement of Store They Robbed While Police Searched the Premises—One Boy Worked in Store That Was Entered. COMMISSIONERS WILL BE ASKED TO ANSWER MANY QUESTIONS

Will the Harbor Board Proposal Involve More Level Crossings Where Ferry Crowds Centre?—Will the Board Finance the Reconstruction of Civic Lines at Standard Gauge?—What Council Wants to Know. Toronto's transportation problem will be discussed this morning at a conference between the board of control and the harbor commission, and again this afternoon at a special meeting of the city council, to prepare a number of bylaws for submission on Jan. 1.

HELD FOR THEFT FROM SWIFT'S OF TORONTO

Mervyn Shaw, Arrested as a Jewel Thief in New York, Admitted Stealing Nearly a Thousand Dollars in Toronto Before Leaving Town Last July. Arrested in a rooming house in New York City by detectives searching his apartments for stolen jewelry, a man known in New York as A. M. Oakes, a waiter, was found to be Mervyn Shaw, 26 years of age, of Toronto, and wanted by the Toronto police on a warrant charging him with the theft of \$750 from Swift and Co., with whom he had formerly been employed as collector. In New York he was held without bail for arraignment before U. S. Commissioner J. A. Shields in extradition proceedings.

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RATES INQUIRY NEARING FINISH

STEAMER LOST CREW RESCUED

J. W. Nicholls of Cleveland Wrecked off North Point in Lake Huron. ALPENA, Mich., Nov. 30.—(Can. Press).—The steamer I. W. Nicholls of Cleveland, which grounded off North Point in Lake Huron last Wednesday night, broke in two during the fierce storm which swept that section of the lake last night. She will probably be a total loss. The crew remained aboard until hope of saving the steamer was abandoned and life savers rescued them shortly before midnight.

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AN OPEN SECRET

It is doubtful if any other member will stand for the recent interference of the harbor commission in what is strictly the affair of the city council.

GOVERNMENT WITHOUT POWER TO CHECK INVASION OF HINDUS

Federal Orders-in-Council Which Have Kept East Indians Out of British Columbia Condemned by Chief Justice Hunter. VANCOUVER, Nov. 30.—(Can. Press).—Chief Justice Hunter has given a sweeping decision condemning as illegal all the federal orders-in-council which have hitherto kept Hindus out of British Columbia. The only grounds on which a Hindu may be excluded are those of idioity, disease, crime or mendacity, merely those which apply generally to British-born citizens entering Canadian eastern ports.

ONARIO JUDGES FINISHED SIXTH

Competition at Chicago Live Stock Show Aroused Keen Interest—Texans Carried off Honors. CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—(Can. Press).—The International Live Stock Show opened Saturday with the students' judging competition in which twelve teams were entered. This competition aroused more interest than ever before, and when the scores were posted Sunday morning in the rotunda of the Stock Yards Inn, it was almost impossible to squeeze thru the crowd. Placings were as follows: Texas, first, score 3684; Missouri, second, 4495; Indiana, third, 3484; Ohio, fourth, 3470; Iowa, fifth, 3460; Ontario, sixth, 3413; Manitoba, seventh, 3409; McDonald, Que., eighth, 3402; Kansas, ninth, 3390; Oklahoma, tenth, 3184; Pennsylvania, eleventh, 3177; Nebraska, twelfth, 3166.

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
