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MR. DEVLIN'S SPEECH.

Full Report of his Position on the School Question.

He opposed the Government Policy that the Bill was on the table...

Our readers will naturally desire to have a full report of Mr. Devlin's contribution to the debate on the School Question in the House of Commons.

Mr. Devlin—I rise for the purpose of explaining in as few words as possible the vote which I propose giving in favour of the second reading of the Bill now under discussion.

It is a matter of course that I cannot do so without referring to the Bill in its present form, and to the position which it occupies in the House of Commons.

I am glad to remember hearing that the hon. member for Ottawa County (Mr. Davlin) who went down to Cape Breton, was one of the loudest there in his desire to see the Bill become law.

I asked him if he had been there, and he answered that he had not, but that he held this upon the authority of a member of Parliament.
