Fitz Gibbon, late Adjutant-General of Militia, and to the Honourable Colonel Macnab, Speaker of the House of Assembly, for their distinguished services in defence of the Province."

The second document is an extract from a Report of a Select Committee of the Honorable the Legislative Council of Upper Canada, dated 13th February, 1838; and is as follows:—

"The hand of a merciful Providence was most signally displayed in a number of favorable circumstances which it would be impiety to ascribe to chance, and which combined to give to the inhabitants of Toronto, at the hour of midnight, an opportunity to arm in their defence and to make such preparations, under the directions of a most vigilant and gallant officer, Colonel Fitz Gibbon, late Adjutant-General of Militia, as served to avert the threatened danger."

The third document is the Resolution by the House of Assembly to address Her Majesty to make a Grant of Land to Colonel Fitz Gibbon, as a mark of Her Majesty's royal favour; and is as follows:—

Extracts from the Jonnal of the House of Assembly, dated January 23rd, 1838.

- "Pursuant to notice, Mr. Merritt, seconded by Mr. Burwell, moves that this House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole, to take into consideration the expediency of addressing Her Majesty, praying Her Majesty to make a Grant of Land to Colonel Fitz Gibbon of the Militia, as a Reward for the Services rendered by him to this Province.
- "Which was carried, and the House was put into Committee of the whole accordingly.
 - " Mr. Ferrie in the Chair.
 - " The House resumed.
- "The Chairman reported that the Committee had agreed to two Resolutions, which he was ready to submit for the adoption of the House.
- "The Report was received, and the Resolutions were adopted, nem. con., as follow:—
