## CHEERY WORDS COME FROM DESOLATED AREA

Rains Make Forest Safe For Travel  
and Period of Reconstruction  
Has Started.

Optimism is the dominant note in the fire-swept area of the north. Concluding a telegram to Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of lands, forests and mines, the relief committee at Porcupine says: "Porcupine will rise from its ashes and make a record, while regretting its calamity and ever mourning of its dead."

The rest of the telegram reads as follows: "Steady showers have been falling for the last 12 hours, resulting in making the woods safe, especially the burned areas, and the work of rebuilding has started. The relief committee at Porcupine says: 'Porcupine will rise from its ashes and make a record, while regretting its calamity and ever mourning of its dead.'"

"While the miners are out of employment during the next 90 days, till the mines erect new buildings, the situation could and should be alleviated by all claim-holders resident in Canada and the United States endeavoring to perform assessment work at once, thereby giving employment to men whose wives and families we are now feeding."

"The railway assures us of its capability of delivering necessary supplies even to South End. As tents can be used in the performance of this work, it should be started at once. This is the most favorable season of the year to perform such work with best results."

**Fire Still Burning.**  
In the course of a letter to J. L. Enghart, the superintendent of construction on the T. & N. O. Railway, J. M. Bourke states that fires have been smoldering in the district for the past two months, but that little notice was taken of them, as they were not deemed serious. However, a furious gale spring up and fanned the fires, devastating a large area. None of the railway employees had been killed, but hundreds of them have had their homes razed to the ground.

Considerable damage was done to the railway property in Camp No. 6 by the dynamite explosion. Three hundred feet of the track was torn up, both on the main line and on the siding. Telegraph poles and fencing were destroyed and a number of dump cars were completely wrecked.

In most of the districts the railway company have only suffered the loss of a few outbuildings, but in the Township of German there are 50,000 ties in danger of being burned.

**72 Deaths Reported.**  
The actual number of deaths reported up to date in the Porcupine district is 72.

Three members of the Women's Local Relief Association, Mrs. Souter, Mrs. Denton and Mrs. Marshall, started yesterday on a tour of the burnt district, with the intention of making a complete investigation of the needs of women and children, when they will send back a complete list of clothing, etc., that is required. They will subsequently see that the relief sent is delivered into the proper hands.

It is estimated by Mr. Todd of the Rimouski Fire Insurance Co., that only 10 per cent of the damage in the Porcupine district is covered by insurance. The total loss to insurance companies he estimates amounts to a little over \$500,000, and this sum is distributed among nearly 50 companies.

**More Relief Sent.**  
Another carload of provisions was ordered yesterday from Young & Co. of North Bay, and a carload of hospital supplies went forward by express last night. The relief fund amounted to \$4,288.90 yesterday afternoon.

## RAILWAY CENSURED FOR DEATH OF WOMAN

Mrs. Catherine Cook Met Death  
Thru Negligence of Employees,  
Says Coroner's Jury.

"That Catherine Cook was injured while alighting from a street car on the night of May 19, 1911, on College-street in this city, and the said injuries resulted in her death at Grace Hospital on July 3, 1911."

"And further, that the said injuries were caused by the negligence of the Toronto Street Railway Co. thru its employees."

The above verdict was brought in last night at the morgue by Coroner Graham's jury.

Fred S. Clidell said that he left the house at 10 o'clock on the day of the accident, walking north on College-street near Elizabeth-street. He heard screams and saw a woman lying on the street. There were no cars near the scene of the accident, and he did not know whether deceased walked or was carried away.

Crown Attorney Louis Monahan, K. C., said there were no other witnesses to be called and Mr. Clidell had come forward of his own free will to tell what he knew of the accident.

H. H. Dewar, K. C., on behalf of the Toronto Street Railway Co., reminded the jury that there was another accident on the night in question quite near the scene of the accident to deceased, and the witness might be confusing the two.

Coroner Graham, in his summing up, said that the evidence was very conflicting and that the jury should be satisfied if they were not sure of the facts before them.

After half an hour's deliberation the jury brought in their verdict.

## HARBOR BOARD APPOINTMENTS

Fifteen Applicants For 3 Vacancies—  
May Take Action To-day.

Many names are available from which to make a choice of the civic representatives on the new harbor commission. Although there is no financial consideration attached to the appointments, at least 15 of the citizens whose names were submitted to the board of control have signified their willingness to serve the city in this responsible position. Only three appointments have to be made by the aldermen.

The commission is to consist of five members, three appointed by the city council, one by the Ottawa authorities on their own initiative, and one at the suggestion of the board of trade in this city.

The civic appointments will likely be made at a meeting of the board of control to-day.

## HYDRO POWER FOR ISLAND

City Thinks Dominion Government  
Will Allow Wires to Be Strung.

The members of the civic deputation who visited Ottawa on Wednesday express themselves as well satisfied with the reception given them. The authorities appeared to be favorably impressed with the presentation of the city's case for permission to string hydro wires across the new western gap from towers placed on each side, and the mayor and controllers are satisfied that the necessary orders will soon be issued.

The petition of the harbor board, endorsed by the city, and asking for the use of the 40-acres of reclaimed land to the south of the new western gap, is to be dealt with by the governor-general in council in a few days. It is very likely that the request will be acceded to.

**The New Steamer Gerolita.**  
The steamer Gerolita, recently built by the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company, for the Ontario and Quebec Navigation Company, will leave Collingwood on Saturday for Toronto, to take her place on the route between this city and Quebec. From reports received this steamer will be one of the most luxurious on the upper lakes.

The Gerolita will leave Toronto each Thursday at noon and proceed to the old city of Quebec without change. The route taken will be by Charlotte, Brighton, down the Bay of Quinte, Kingston, all the rapids, Thousand Islands, Gananoque, Brockville, Prescott, Cornwall and Montreal.

**Disappeared From Home.**  
BEAMSVILLE, July 20.—Residents of this town and vicinity have been puzzled by the disappearance of Miss Anna Hooker, daughter of her late husband, Mr. Daniel Konkle, with whom she had been staying.

Miss Hooker left home a week ago last night and has not been heard of or seen since.

She is only 16 years old, but is exceptionally tall and wears her hair up, so that she appears older. She has dark hair and grey eyes.

**Bequests Amounted to \$125,000.**  
Over \$125,000 was divided amongst the beneficiaries of five estates in the surrogate court yesterday. The estates dealt with were: Michael O'Shaughnessy, \$55,874; the beneficiaries of this estate are Daniel and Edward J. O'Shaughnessy, who each receive one-third, and three nephews and three nieces, who divide the remaining third amongst them.

### TORONTO MAN ELECTED MASONIC GRAND MASTER

Deputy Also From Queen City—  
Next Year's Meeting Will Be  
Held in This City.

ST. CATHARINES, July 20.—(Special.)—The Masonic Grand Lodge of Canada for the Province of Ontario this afternoon completed the business of the 45th annual convention and adjourned to meet next year in Toronto.

Delegates voted in large numbers for the Queen City, in preference to either Hamilton or Port Arthur. They evidently had sufficient of the smaller city hotel accommodation.

When the meeting opens next year, a Toronto man will occupy both the grand master's and deputy's chair. Deputy White having been elevated to the chief position, and W. D. McPherson having been chosen over three opponents to fill the position of deputy grand master. But for the fact that McPherson was a Toronto man, he would have probably been elected on the first ballot, as many were loath to give both honors to Toronto. However, McPherson was ready at 3 o'clock.

It is most likely that for the next four years the Masonic grand master will reside in Toronto, as it is the custom to give the grand master two terms.

Macdonald, Toronto; grand junior warden, A. Grobb, St. Catharines; grand junior warden, T. G. Davis, London; grand chaplain, Rev. S. A. Wood, Chesham; grand registrar, C. W. Hantschell, Hamilton; grand purveyor, W. M. Poulton, Belleville; W. J. Drope, Grimsby; Frederick Guest, St. Thomas; W. H. Wardrop, Hamilton.

The grand master appointed the following to the board of general purveyors: Geo. Naylor, Ingersoll; Geo. S. May, Ottawa; C. W. Hantschell, Hamilton; R. H. Revell, Walkerville; J. A. McFadden, Toronto.

### Death From Natural Causes.

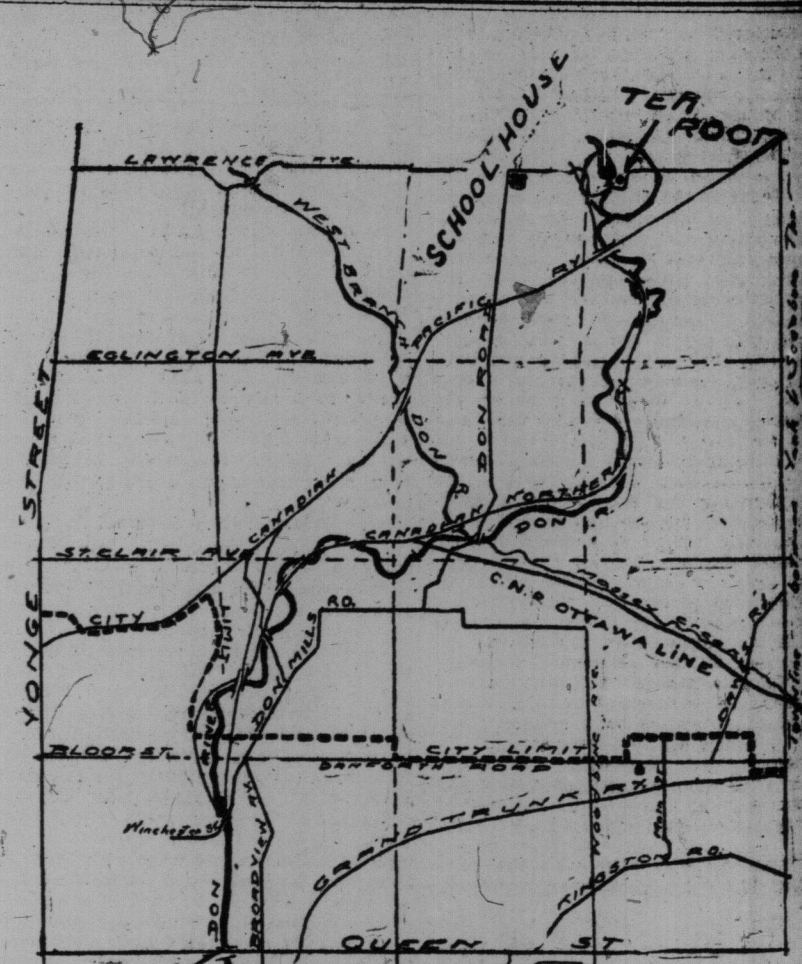
