Young Sherman Makes Best Score 75, With Hilton of England One Streke Behind.

RYE, N.Y., Sept. 11.—The sun had disappeared behind the Westchester Hills when the last of the 170 starters in to-day's 18-hole qualifying round for the 17th amateur golf championships holed out on the final green and it was discovered that only those having cards of 84 or better could contiue to-morrow. As there were 60

having cards of \$4 or better could continue to-morrow. As there were 60 players who made \$3 or better the 10 who scored \$4 for the round will play off to-morrow for the round will play off to-morrow for the remaining four places, for only \$4 players can compete in the final medal round of the 18 holes to-morrow foremoon. The best \$2 scores for the \$6 holes will then be taken for the first round of each play in the afternoon.

Thomas M. Sherman of Utica, a son of Vice-President Sherman, carried off the honors of the day by making the 18 holes in 75 strokes. This was one stroke better than was shown by the cards of H. H. Hilton, the British champion; W. C. Evwnes, ir., of Plitsburg, the American Title-holder; Chas. Evans, ir., of Chicago; Robert A. Gardner, also of Chicago, and Yale and A. H. Raett of the Crescent Athletic Club. There were a dozen others who bettered the eighty mark, and in this number appeared J. Douglas Brown of the Munray Field Club of Edinburgh. Scotland, who in 1907 was the Irish champion. Brown is regarded to-night as a dark horse, and has been coupled with Hilton in the betting on the possibility of the Havemeyer Cup going to Great Britain. Hilton was easily the golfing magnet of the day, and drew after him a gallery of more than a hundred. The greater part of this crowd left him at the 16th green, however, in order to watch Chic Evans, who was then on his outward journey. George S. Lyon of Toronto, who was one of those who had to play in the driving rain, qualified with a card of 84.
