## Play Cup Final To-day

### Note and Comment

More than fifty boxing clubs under the supervision of the New York State Athletic Commission have taken in nearly \$600,000 in gate receipts since the Frayley law became operative last August, while almost \$200,000 representing the 5 per cent. tax has been paid over to the state treasury. It is roughly estimated that more than 30,000 persons have paid admissions to the clubs, with the dead-head list reaching the 60,000 mark. The commission's first annual report to be made to the present legislature will show that boxing has become extremely popular under the new law.
