## A NEW SERVICE CANADA TO FRANCE DUNDAS STREET MAY BE

Newly-Formed Million Dollar Company Proposes to Operate Six Vessels.

Montreal, April 18. - Among the joint stock companies incorporated at Ottawa during the past week is the Canadian Transatlantic Company, Limited, with a capital of \$1,000,000.

The company in question has been formed by interests close to the Canada Steamship Lines and the Companie Generale Transatlantique and will operate six vessels between Canadian and French ports, the vessels to be approximately of 6000 and 8000 tons dead weight.
