The engagements of about 1,000,000 bushels of wheat for export yesterday caused a firm opening. Shorts were principal buyers, and after their wants had been supplied the market became dull and a steady feeling prevalled for some; time, when there was a sudden break of 1c in antielpetion of a bearish crop report by The Modern Miller. When it was published it was interpreted as being rather bullish and the market advanced about 1½ cents, closing firm at the top. Cables lower, but there were very large acceptances, and the demand to-day has been good, 100,000 bushels being sold at Chicago, and 75 loads worked at New York. There were very bad reports from Russia, claiming that crop had been greatly over-estimated and that shipments would soon cease.
