CARLOS OFFERED THE CROWN

Refused It Because of Spain's Deploable Condition.

When the Present Government Have Wrecked the Country Don Carlos Will Begin the Work of Rebuilding—Hopeless Bunting in the Conduct of the War.

New York, June 22.—R. D. De la Cortina, who is the accredited agent in the United States of Don Carlos, pretender to the throne of Spain, has returned to this country from Europe, arriving here on the steamship Southward. Although of Spanish birth, Don Carlos is a naturalized American citizen.

Don Carlos told a representative of The Herald that the object of his visit to Europe was to meet Don Carlos in Brussels. In this respect, he said, his journey was successful. He declared that the crown of Spain, six weeks ago, was offered to Don Carlos, and was refused. Don Carlos preferring not to take upon himself the responsibility of directing Spain's affairs in the present crisis.

Don Carlos was asked for particulars, but he refused to reveal the source of the offer. He said he had absolute orders from his chief to preserve secrecy. All he would say was that the tender was made in the presence of Don Carlos and Don Carlos' private secretary, and was accompanied with the assurance of strong military support.

"Don Carlos refused to take the throne at present," Don Carlos said, "as any sensible man would have done." The people in control now have committed a colossal blunder in engaging in this war, and he will not be involved in it. They must settle it themselves, and when Spain is beaten and humiliated, Don Carlos will step in and lead the work of reconstruction.

The management of the war has been pitiful. The Cadix fleet goes out, comes in again, and once more goes out. The people where it is going, and I do not believe the naval authorities themselves do, Montijo is abandoned to his fate in the Philippines, and the army left without aid in Santiago. There is no sign of adequate preparation for war, and Spain's military forces are being sent to their death by incompetent rulers at home.

"Weyler is not a Carlist—he is simply a Weylerist, and is not great enough to lead a party. He belongs to no party, and is waiting to see who will take control of affairs before endeavoring his partnership. The Carlist party is too great an army, too powerful to need the aid of men with records like Weyler's."

"Sagasta and his party are fit only to be thrown on the scrap heap. First Sagasta was a Republican and then a monarchist. When Don Carlos returns Sagasta will be found seeking favor from the new King."

The next step in the evolution of Spanish Government will be a republic. It is the opinion of Don Carlos. When it is known that Don Carlos is not a monarchist, he said, "the people will turn to Republicanism, for they must get rid of the present monarchy. The Carlist party will not last. The Republicans are divided into seven or eight factions, and have no great leadership. The Carlist party is one of the factions, has brains, but no force. He is not a natural leader of men. If Sagasta and his party are not to be thrown on the scrap heap, they must be able to lead the people."

Speaking of the war, Don Carlos said: "There is no hope for the Carlist cause, but one opinion as to the result is entertained in Europe. Spain cannot fight with the United States. The Carlist cause will be sooner or later crushed. The more pleased I will be."

Don Carlos told on May 9, and has spent the time since then with his chief in Brussels. His opinions are supposed to reflect those of his chief.

COUNTY JUDGES MEET

Business Transacted Yesterday at Their Annual Assembly in Osogood Hall.

The Board of County Judges held their annual meeting yesterday at Osogood Hall. Present were Judges J. H. Hamilton, who resigned at this meeting; Judge Dean being appointed in his place; Judges Woods (St. John), Judge Chadwick of Guelph, Judge Ballin of Nipissing, Judge Fitzgerald, Welland, and Judge McLaughlin. The association meets annually to discuss questions of practice, etc., arising in the county court proceedings.

The advisability of increasing the number of Division Courts was discussed, and the following will be established: The Fifth Division Court, of Algonquin, at Chelmsford and the Sixth Division Court of Nipissing, at Warren. The date of the annual meeting was changed to the first Thursday of September, a much more convenient date than the present.

Judge Morson was appointed Secretary-Treasurer, vice Judge Dartnall of Wilfrid. Judge Morson expressed a wish that a High Court Judge give his opinion on the case to which Mr. Bicknell agreed.

Yesterday Crown Attorney Dewar and James Bicknell, representing the Mimico Railway Company, appeared before Judge McLaughlin to settle the terms of the case to go before the Divisional Court.
