Ottawa, March 28.—(Special.)—Three good speeches in one day is a pretty fair record for the seventh day of a debate on the address, when it might be supposed that nearly everything that could be said on address, when it might be supposed that nearly everything that could be said on almost every subject had been said. Yet two good speeches were made by Conservatives to-day, which were not mere rehashes of what had been already said, and Mr. Tarte also made a speech which was good in its way and which was characterized by even more than his usual boldness. Mr. Clancy's speech this afternoon was a careful and well balanced criticism of the Government policy, especially on the so-called preferential tariff, and Mr. Bennett's attack on Mr. Tarte and his ways was a telling effort. Mr. Clancy, continuing, said the scandal ous position of the oil trade, now in the hands of the Standard Oil trust; the bungling of the Franchise Act, and the preferential tariff, were evidences of unsurpassed incapacity. To show that the farmer had not benefited by the "preferential" tariff, he enumerated 30 articles of prime necessity to the farmers, the importations of which last year totalied \$2,468,000. Of this amount, \$53,959 worth only came in under the preferential tariff, resulting in a saving in duty of \$1823. There was another lot of items, such as scythes, snaths, reaping hooks and wire nails, to which Mr. McMillian of Hurok was wont to paint as articles that would be cheapened to the farmer by the preferential tariff. Dealing with the Postoffice Department, Mr. Clancy blamed the P.M.G. for his arbitrary exercise of the power of cancelling mail contracts, and for the Jubilee stamp issue. He contended that the higher issues of these stamps were practically repudiated, and were of no use.

Mr. Mulock replied that what he meant was that those stamps were being used in the regular way. As an instance, he would say that recently, being in the Ottawa Postoffice on business, the postmaster showed him a parcel addressed to England on which there was about \$8 worth of stamps, including one \$5 stamp.

GEN. McARTHUR IS RESTING

He Halted His Troops Until Supplies and Ammunition Can be Brought Up.

Spanish Steamer After a Hot Chase and the Firing of Two Shots-An Advance Was to Begin at Daybreak This Morning-Strong Position To Be Attacked.

Washington, March 28.-There was a lull to-day in the reports from the scene of action north of Manila, which for a time was rather mystifying to the War Department authorities. Only one despatch from Gen. Otis was received during the day and this related to yesterday afternoon. 15 was not until the Associated Press despatch came late in the day, telling that the American forces were resting beyond Marilao, that Gen. Otis' situation day's movements was explained. After the arduous work of a three days' fight, under a fierce tropical sun, through rice swamps and jungles, it was explained by the authorities here that McArthur would conserve the energies of his men by a halt long enough to rest and take supplies before the nual blow against Malolos, the insurgent capital.
