He does not cease to protest against the deplorable spirit which reigns in England to-day, to censure British pharisaism and egotism, and he joyfully seizes every opportunity vouchsafed him to assert aloud his sympathy and filial attachment for the old land which was the first mother country of Canada, namely, France.
