#### THE NEGLECTED EAST SIDE OF TORONTO.

The Globe of yesterday has an article dealing with the remarkable growth of the city toward the east, especially for factory purposes. The World takes this occasion again to point out to the people of Toronto, what we have told them many times before, that the only reason why the city has not grown to the east, and why it is becoming heavy with progress on one side, and why the centre of the city threatens to go to Spadina-avenue, is wholly and solely because of the absence of high level viaducts over the Don valley. If the viaduct from the east end of Bloor-street, across the Don valley to Danforth-avenue, were built as it should have been built long ago, and the street car lines run out to East Toronto Village, there would be no need of the finest factory sites available forthwith. To mention splendid residential property, all within two miles of the corner of Queen and Yonge-streets. Some day Winchester street should have a viaduct over to Broadview-avenue and the same thing would happen. If anyone wishes to know what the high level viaducts are doing, let him look at the Sherbourne-street viaduct, and the Huntley-street bridge over the Rosedale ravine, and see what they have done for Rosedale. Rosedale is the most progressive part of the city to-day, but it became so only after the Sherbourne-street viaduct was built and the street cars taken into Rosedale. The aldermen of the first, second and third wards are lacking in their duty to the people they represent and the people themselves are negligent of their own interests if they hesitate for another moment in insisting on the construction of the Broadview-avenue extension across the Don valley. It may cost \$300,000, or it may cost less; it depends largely on the engineer employed, and how he approaches the problem, and whether he approaches it with up-to-date methods. Spanning ravines is now becoming a comparatively easy matter to expert men, and the city ought to get the best possible advice on this problem. With these viaducts an effort ought to be made for east and west car lines across the city over continuous streets. As The World has pointed out before, there should be a great east and west star service across the city, about Wilton-avenue. But so far everything is being done for the west, and not a thing for the east. As was pointed out in The World before, hundreds of thousands of dollars have been spent to make continuous streets and street car lines in the west by way of the Dundas-street bridge, Queen-street subway, King-street subway and the bridge over the Esplanade at John-street, Spadina-avenue, Bathurst-street and the like. Something of the same kind must be done for the east side of the city, and the business men of Yonge-street, and the people who live on the east side must get it for themselves. All they seem to do is to pay their money out in improvements for the west end and to neglect their own interests.

#### TAKING THE LAUNDRIES.

To the average citizen, there seems to be something of injustice in the decision of the Property Committee of the City Council to impose a uniform tax of \$50 on all laundries. The tax is open to serious objections. In the first place, it seems to be aimed at a particular class of citizens—the small laundries, to wit, in discouraging the Chinese washer-men (if that is the real aim of the measure) will it not at the same time cripple the small white laundryman and the poor woman who hangs out a little shingle and cleanses family clothing for a living? If laundries are to be taxed at all, the impost should be graded according to the amount of floor space occupied.

#### FAVORS MASSEY HALL.

Woodstock Sentinel Review: The Toronto World, which handled the Joshua Massey case very cleverly, is working up a fund for Sanford and his brave rescuers. It is said that the young man now declares that his whole life has been changed. He wishes to become an educated man, and is anxious to study for the ministry. He certainly deserves a testimonial from the public, or a fund that will enable him to begin life anew. But it will be a long time before he should be allowed to tell his experiences to the public, even if he were the only one. The suggestion is that Sanford and his rescuers should appear in public at Massey Hall and be presented with medals and other testimonials that the public may raise for them. The idea of men of such heroic mould as Sanford and any of his rescuers lending themselves to some fake show for the sake of money-making is as odious to the public as we are glad to hear, it is to them.

#### THE INSURANCE MONITOR OF NEW YORK.

In commenting on the recent reorganization of the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance Company of New York, said: "The Mutual Reserve has raised the goal for which its officers so long have been striving. On the 17th of April, on the recommendation of Superintendent Hendricks, it was re-incorporated under the legal reserve statutes of this State, and received its charter as a purely mutual, old-line insurance institution. It starts out on its new career with admitted assets of nearly \$8,000,000, and a surplus in excess of all liabilities, including the full legal reserve, of nearly half a million. The most searching examination to which the company has ever been subjected at the hands of the New York Insurance Department preceded this radical change of base. Three months were occupied in this examination. Every item of the company's accounts was closely scrutinized. Every doubt, at the request of the officers themselves, was resolved against the company. Liabilities on policies taken out by the Northwestern, the in reality an asset, offsetting to their full amount any liability under those policies, were simply deducted from the face of the policies themselves, and the reserve thus charged against the company, with the acquiescence of the officers exceeded, by not far from \$100,000, the amount under the extraordinary reorganization of its new career on a basis so conservative as to leave the company in a position where, whether the accepted figures have done it justice, The real estate holdings are valued by the department at higher figures than those claimed by the company.

#### WONDERS OF A NEW GAS.

Inventor Claims That It Will Cure Consumption.  
London, July 4.—Remarkable properties are claimed for the new gas called electrod by its discoverer, Prof. Rychenow of Lemberg, who declares that it is a cure for consumption. When condensed the gas assumes the form of tiny greenish-blue balls, which are elastic like india-rubber, and emit rays under the influence of which the growth of plants and flowers is greatly accelerated, and organic matter is preserved from decomposing.

#### IT IS ALWAYS MORGAN.

He Has Now Bought a Library of 32 Volumes.  
London, July 4.—The Times laments the continuous wholesale exportation of rare, early-printed books and illuminated manuscripts to the United States. It points out that the drain has been going on for more than half a century, and has recently reached huge proportions. Now, says The Times, it has to be chronicled the most important single transaction of this sort that has ever taken place, or is likely to take place. Sotheby, Wilkinson & Hodge have just sold by private treaty to Mr. J. P. Morgan, of New York, a collection of 32 volumes, which were formerly the property of the late William Morris.

#### FRANCE'S FINANCES.

Scheme Proposed to Convert \$3 p.c. Rentes into 5 p.c.  
Paris, July 4.—The Minister of Finance, M. Rouvier, expects to introduce a bill in the Chamber of Deputies July 8, providing for the conversion of 8 1/2 per cent. rentes into three per cent. It is understood that the government undertakes in the bill not to convert either the new or the old three per cent. for a period not yet determined upon. The bill would convert 35,000,000 francs (\$70,000,000).

#### WHY NORTH AND IS QUIET.

Strike Among Her Crew Halted at Mackinac Island.  
Detroit, Mich., July 4.—A special to The Free Press from Petoskey, Mich., says: The steamer Northland, plying between Chicago and Buffalo, is tied up at Mackinac Island by a strike among the crew. It is claimed that they have not been paid, and, last night, they refused to allow the boat to proceed.

#### COUNT COMING HERE.

New York, July 4.—Rocco Diavolich, Count of Lissa, who has traveled around the world, getting himself arrested in the most curious manner, and of experiencing the various methods of prison discipline, is here again, having arrived on the steamship Havag. He explains his mission as the investigation of conditions existing in various asylums and public institutions for the poor and the criminal generally. He is going to Toronto, Canada, shortly.

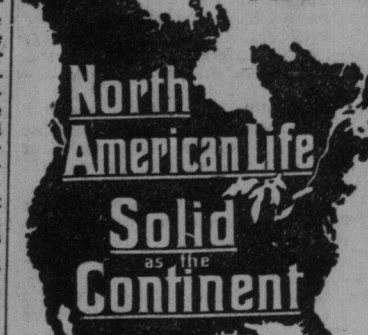
#### SEPARATE SCHOOLS FOR BLACKS.
