PACIFIC CABLE'S PROGRESS. London, Aug. 25.—A cable which is to connect Canada with Australia across the Pacific, now being laid at the joint expense of the United King-dom, Canada and the Australian Com-monwealth, has already been com-pleted from Vancouver, B.C., to Fan-ning Island, just south of the Ha-maning Islands, and it is expected the entire line will be completed by the end of the present year.
