TORONTO CALLS OFF CAP GAME

Toronto, Sept. 5.—The News says: Through a mutual agreement, the Toronto and the Capitals have decided to call off the game they were to have played in Ottawa on the 14th inst.

Both these teams are so far out of the running that no good purpose would be served by playing the game.

Certainly, there would be no money in it for either team.

"The opinion entertained by both ourselves and the Capital management," said Mr. Fred Thompson, the secretary of the Toronto, today, "is that the public have had about enough lacrosse for the present season."

"They will not turn out to see a match in the fall unless the teams are in the running, as was the case with both the local clubs last September."

"This being the case, we decided to disband after the game in Montreal, thus saving two weeks in salaries, and this we did with the full concurrence of the Capital management, otherwise we would have played out the schedule."

While the N. L. U. season, so far as the Queen City is concerned, will be terminated if the Shamrocks defeat the Capitals

on Saturday, the lacrosse-loving public here will have one more chance to witness a stirring encounter before the football season commences.

At a meeting on the coming Saturday the Toronto will meet the Tecumsehs in the second of two games to decide the city championship.

In the first of these matches—that played on Aug. 5—the Tecumsehs were victorious by a score of 16 to 7.

While the Toronto have little hope of being able to overtake this lead so as to appropriate the championship, they still entertain the impression that they can down the Indians in a single match.

And they are going into the contest on Saturday intent upon demonstrating this point.

That they are in earnest is evident from the fact that they are practicing this week without any hope of drawing a salary for their efforts.

The match on Saturday, in their estimation, is not to be played for the money that is in it, but merely to debate the question as to which is the better team.

That being the spirit behind the contest, the match should be one of the best of the season.

The Walking Barber to Try Again

Jimmy Reynolds, the walking barber, of Port Hope, who made the sensational attempt some time ago to walk to Toronto and back in 36 hours, is not content with his past performance, and before long will be engaged in another onslaught on the record.

This time, however, Jimmy will have things a little different, inasmuch as his attempt will be in the form of a race.

Since Reynolds' last attempt the citizens of Peterboro have been startled by the performances of one David Hartley, whose latest feat has been a 34-mile walk, from Baileysboro to Peterboro, in 5 hours and 48 minutes. Hartley thinks he is a better man

than Reynolds, and he has accordingly challenged the latter to a race over the Port Hope to Toronto route.

Reynolds is willing to arrange the match, but only under certain conditions.

He will not walk in the hot weather under any circumstances, and, as Hartley is much younger, Jimmy Reynolds being 57 years of age, and, as Hartley is confident of his powers, Jimmy will demand a handicap of four hours.

He will then undertake to walk to Toronto and back with the Peterboro chap and beat him. He says that if he is now up to Hartley to put up or shut up. Jimmy will wager any sum Hartley likes to name.

London in International League?

Hurro! Note the very latest from the city of pipes, Toronto:

An effort is being made to organize an international baseball league, with teams in Hamilton, London, Guelph, Chatham, and other Canadian cities, and in Auburn, N.Y., Erie, Pa., and Corning, N.Y. Oil City, Pa., Schenectady, Oswego, or other American places close to the border. Umpire Danahey, of Rochester, is behind the scheme, and he has issued a call to all places interested to send in applications for membership, and to be presented at a meeting to be held at the Clinton House, Rochester, on Oct. 2, when application will be made for C. class representation and protection. Umpire Danahey will be remembered

as having been a member in the old Canadian and International Leagues. He was a catcher, and played under the name of Hayes. He has had a lot of baseball experience, and is confident that such a league as he proposes would be a paying proposition.

Associated with him in the enterprise are a number of prominent baseball men, including "Howdy" Earl, manager of the A. J. and G. team of the New York State League; William McNamara, catcher and manager of the Albany team, of the New York State League; Capt. William Lawson, Rochester, whose team won the pennant in the Hudson River League; George H. Geer, Syracuse, ex-president of the New York State League.

No Money in Turf Says Keene

"With All My Success, I Have Made No Money," Declares Great Colin's Owner.

Five of Keene's Horses Alone Won \$241,440.

"I would not advise any man to start a breeding and racing establishment with the expectation of making a profit on his investment. With all my successes taken into consideration, I do not know that I have made money out of my horses."

What Mr. Keene, who has dared both Wall street and the race track, says is all the more remarkable from the fact that his stable this year has set a new record for the American turf in winnings. No other string of thoroughbreds owned by one man has ever won within \$100,000 of the immense sum to the credit of the Keene stable—\$241,000. His string at the present time is conceded to be the grandest lot of horses in conformation, size and breeding, that ever looked through a bridle. The only "classic" that has escaped them this year so far, was the Suburban Handicap.

The last and the richest victory of the season was the Futurity Stake, won by Colin, which, as a 2-year-old, has already made for his owner \$97,530.

Mr. Keene has started this year Colin, Besom, Chaplet, Citizen, Earl's Court, Frigate, Inconito, Mask and Paces, Masque, Meggs, Hill, Rostigouche, Selectus, Sepoy, Transvaal and Twigs. There are others yet to make their appearance, and turfmen are wondering what the outcome of their efforts will be.

"It fancy that Colin is the greatest horse of his age that has ever been in my stable," said Mr. Keene yesterday. "What is more, Rowe and those who work about the stable are of the same opinion. Rowe says that he is a wonderful colt, and Rowe has had more chance, possibly, than anybody else to realize the strength and fitness of the horse."

It has been said of Mr. Keene that next to his family there is nothing which he holds with greater affection than the memory of Domino, the great black stallion, which was a son of Illmyar, and a descendant of Eclipse. In former days Keene went to Sheepshead Bay and spent hours visiting with Domino, as he did later with Sysonby, and has recently with Peter Pan and Colin.

As a 2-year-old Domino is credited with having won for his owner \$190,000. When the great horse died in Kentucky, in 1897, Mr. Keene caused to be erected over the grave a monument which testified to his love for the horse. The inscription reads: "One of the best friends I ever had, and the fleetest horse ever foaled, is dead."

Rugby From Hamilton's Standpoint

Hamilton, Sept. 5.—The agitation started by the Spectator last fall with a view to bringing about an amalgamation of the strongest teams in Ontario and Quebec Rugby unions into one strong union is just now beginning to bear fruit. At the time it was admitted by men prominent in football circles in Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal and Hamilton that such an amalgamation as the Spectator suggested would be a good thing for the game, but the trouble was that there was no person to come forward and start the ball a rolling. Now, however, the ball has been started and it is to be hoped that it will not be allowed to stop until something has been accomplished. The matter was informally discussed at a meeting held at Ottawa last evening, George Ballard, of this city, representing the Ontario Union. Montreal was the only club that did not fall into line immediately and its representative asked for more time to consider the proposal. Another meeting is to be held in Toronto on Saturday night and it is likely that something will be accomplished at it.

The chief objection to the proposed union would be that the traveling expenses of the teams would be considerably increased, but the Spectator has all along contended that the increased game receipts would more than offset the increased expenses. For the past few years in both the Ontario and Quebec unions the interest in the games has not been maintained be-

cause the teams have not been evenly matched. The Argos were the only team in the Ontario Union capable of giving the Tigers anything approaching an argument, while the Rough Riders and Montreal have been the only contenders in the Quebec Union race. With these four teams in one union the fans would see some great football, and the Victorias, Peterboro, London, Westmounts, of Montreal, and other teams would be able to drop back into their proper place—the intermediate ranks.

LACROSSE.

Montreal, Sept. 5.—There is no truth in a sensational report published here today that the Shamrocks would meet tonight to take steps towards the expulsion of the Tecumsehs from the N. L. U. The Shamrock executive had its regular meeting tonight, but no reference was made to the matter in question, and the report which was published in an afternoon paper, that the matter would be brought up, caused considerable amusement. Ald. O'Connell, honorary president of the Shamrocks, said tonight that there was absolutely nothing in the story. He had to leave the city on a business trip, and the latter stated that he knew nothing of the matter. Ald. O'Connell declared that the Shamrocks had no quarrel whatever with the Tecumsehs. The story is believed to have originated in Ottawa.

SHAM WAR HARD WORK

All Sorts of Discomforts to the Troops on Salisbury Plains.

London, Sept. 5.—Going two days without food, sleeping nights on the bare ground without tents or even blankets and with a steady rain turning the ground into a morass and soaking them through and through, with no chance to get dry in the morning, and not even a cup of coffee for breakfast—these are some of the "real things" hardships of war that the troops taking part in the six-

days' sham battle on Salisbury Plains have been up against, and the boys who got the worst dose of it would have a heap sight rather fight than go through such another experience.

Heavy rains caused it all. The roads got so muddy that the transport service of the "Reds" broke down and the highways were blocked with vehicles carrying supplies, which were stranded and lost in the darkness. The First Royal Scots fared worst of all, going two days without food.
