#### Progress of the Hurricane That Swept the Windward Islands.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 16 .- The hurricane which swept the Windward Islands Saturday last was encountered on Sunday morning by the Norwegian steamer Avona, which arrived yesterday morning. Capt. Frostad, the master of the Avona, states there were barometer indications before the storm struck the vessel and he was, therefore, not unprepared to meet it, but it was necessary to heave the vessel to to avoid serious consequences. storm sprang up from the southeast early on Sunday and lasted until the next day, when there was an intermission of a dead calm, lasting for six hours. Then the hurricane raged with renewed vigor. Capt. Frostad believes that many vessels foundered and will

Montreal, Sept. 16.-Montreal barbers were hit hard today in a circular is-sued by the local board of health, which says: Beyond all doubt, anyone who patronizes a barber or hair-dresser, whose establishment is open to all comers, runs a great risk of becoming infected by disease from the razor, shaving brush, scissors, clippers, comb or hair brush having been previously used on a sick person, or even on a corpse. At the present moment in the whole Province of Quebec there is not a single barber who can honestly say that his instruments are absolutely, completely and scientifically safe in regard to possibility of conveying infection. # On the White Nile

The French Have Strong Force at Fashoda.

Said Te Be Backed by 10,000 Abyssinians.

Gen. Kitchener Dispatches an Expedition to the Scene.

The Barbadoes Hurricane Lasted Ten Hours.

Assistance Urgently Needed by Thousands of Homeless People.

Salisbury Said to Have Backed Down in Regard to the Chinese Railway Deal-The Allans Likely to Get the Fast Mail Contract.

London, Sept. 16 .- Next to the highest balloon ascension on record was made here yesterday afternoon from the Crystal Palace, Sydenham, by Stanley Spencer, the well-known aeronaut, and Dr. Berson. The balloon, which was inflated with pure hydrogen, and has a capacity of 56,500 cubic

fer attained an altitude of 27,500 feet. At a height of 25,000 feet the air was so rarified that the occupants of the car were compelled to breathe compressed oxygen by tubes. The temperature was 61 degrees below freezing point. The atmosphere was clear and the coast distincty visible. The balloon finally descended near Romford, in Essex.

A FUNERAL TRAIN. Vienna, Sept. 16.—The funeral train

bearing the remains of the late Empress of Austria entered the empire Wednesday night. Everywhere there were vast, silent crowds and the tolling of bells. Many floral wreaths were brought to the train to be placed on the casket. The funeral train arrived in Vienna at 10 o'clock. The whole route of the procession was lined with troops, and immense crowds, barehead-

ed, stood silently watching.

Among the wreaths, the one from President McKinley attracts much attention. It was the Stars and Stripes intertwined, and bears the inscription "From the President of the United States-a tribute of heart-felt sympathy to the memory of a noble and gracious lady." All the festivities in connection with the jubilee of Emp Francis Joseph have been completely abandoned. The emperor will spend six months in almost absolute retirement, only attending to state business.

A SPANISH REPORT.

Madrid, Sept. 16 .- According to reports from Manila, one-third of the prisoners of Gen. Aguinaldo have died of bad treatment. The peace commissioners will be appointed today.

CHINESE OUTRAGES. London, Sept. 16 .- The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily News says reports have been received there of serious rioting at Ho Chaou, 50 miles from Chung Kiang. The American and French missions have been attacked, and the latter burned.

THE TROUBLE AT CANDIA. Candia, Island of Crete, Sept. 16 .- An aide-de-camp of Djovad Pasha boarded the British flagship and announced that 39 houses from which the British troops had been fired upon had been demolished, and that 113 of the ringleaders of the disturbances had been Forty-three of the ringleaders who had been arrested were delivered to the British admiral.

LORD SALISBURY SAID TO HAVE YIELDED. London, Sept. 16.-The Pekin correspondent of the Times says: Despite Lord Salisbury's declaration that he would brook no interference from any other power in the Niu Chwang Railway loan contract, he has now yielded to all the conditions Russia im-As a result negotiations with the English syndicate have been broken off, and those with the Russian-Chinese Bank have been resumed.

A KIND QUEEN. Madrid, Sept. 15 .- The queen regent pays daily visits to the sick soldiers who have returned from the colonies She has ordered the convalescents to be conveyed in the royal carriages to the Casa Del Campo, in the royal park, and is paying from her own purse for proper food for the invalids. The correspondent here of the Associated Press has conversed with officers invalids and others who have returned from Santiago de Cuba, and they all extol the kindness of the Americans in the surrendered city. They do not display the slightest animosity

against the Americans, but entertain bitter feelings against the Cubans. FRENCH MINISTERIAL CRISIS. Paris, Sept. 16 .- Newspapers here say the minister of justice, M. Sarrien, has completed the examination of the documents in the Dreyfus case. intention is to refer the matter to a commission competent to undertake a revision of the proceedings. The general opinion is that the cabinet will adopt the proposal for revision unanimously, with the exception of the minister of war, Gen. Zurlinden, who has informed the minister of justice that he intended to resign if it should develop he does not agree with his col-

According to the Gaulois the result of the decision of the minister of justice will be a ministerial crisis, as other ministers will also resign.

THE AURANIA AT QUEENSTOWN. Queenstown, Sept. 16.-The Cunard line steamer Aurania (Capt. McKay), from New York, Sept. 6, via Liverpool which was yesterday reported off the south coast of Ireland disabled and in tow, arrived here at 2 o'clock this morning. The captain of the Aurania reports that the crank shaft broke at 9:20 p.m. on Sept. 13. At 5:15 o'clock on

a the following evening, while the steamer was 116 miles west of Fastnet, the British steamer Marino (Capt. Webster), from Montreal Sept. 2, for London, sighted the Aurania, and subsequently took her in tow. All on board the Aurania are well. All the passengers will be landed at this port, and the steamer will be towed to Liverpool.

> A picture of Halifax in 1750 has been

> discovered in the British Museum. A Canadian postage stamp, value 7½ pence, Halifax currency, or 6 pence sterling, was sold by auction yester-day, bringing £9, or 360 times its normal value. This stamp became obsolete in 1857.

At Lauzanne, Switzerland, two arrests have been made in connection with the assassination on Saturday last of the Empress Elizabeth of Austria. One is a dangerous aparchist, who is believed to have made the handle for the file with which the empress was murdered. The second is an anarchist, charged with harboring Luchien, the

assassin, for several days. The Financial News says the Allan Steamship Company will probably secure the contract for the fast Atlantic steamers.

Every mail bring a large number of letters from Canada which are overweight, and therefore call for the payment of double postage. Canadian correspondents, it is said, never weigh their letters, and thus causes much inconvenience.

#### TRADE WITH BRITAIN.

Beneficial Effects of the Preferential Tariff.

London, Sept. 16 .- The British board of trade returns for August show the influence of the new Canadian tariff. British exports to Canada increased 11 per cent during August and 15 per cent for eight months. British exports to all countries only increased 71/2 per cent, and decreased 3 per cent respectively. British imports from Canada increased 10 per cent for the month and decreased 5 per cent for the eight months. Imports from all countries increased 11½ per cent for the month and 5 per cent for the eight months. The chief increase in imports from Canada for the eight months Butter, £73,000; eggs, £23,000; fish, £145,000; wheat, £98,000; wheat flour, £176,000; bacon, £318,000. chief decreases were: Hams, £2,000; cheese £221,000: animals, £191,000 metals, £18,000; wood, £810,000.

#### FRENCH AT FASHODA

Gen. Kitchener Dispatches a Strong Force Up the White Nile.

London, Sept. 16.-The Constantinople correspondent of the Daily News says: News has been received here of the occupation of Fashoda (on the Nile, south of Khartoum) by French expedition under Major Marchand, assisted by 10,000 Abyssinians under Ras Makonnen, the principal general of Emperor Menelek.

The Daily Telegraph's special corforces in the Soudan telegraphed that he had had an interview with the captain of a boat, which has returned from Fashoda, and that the captain's description of the flag raised there leaves no doubt that it is French. The captain says the garrison at Fashoda menaced him. After getting out of the zone of the garrison's fire, the captain landed and ascertained from natives that the dervishes at Fashoda had been attacked by a force of eight Europeans and 100 Senegalese soldiers, who defeated the dervishes and killed 100 and drove the rest in precipitate flight from the town. The Daily Telegraph's correspondent says: There is no doubt that this is the Mar-

chand expedition. The correspondent describes Gen. Kitchener's efforts to prevent the news reaching England. He says: I wired this identical news a week ago from Omdurman. The strdar flatly refused to allow any correspondent to accompany him south of Omdurman or to go independently. He compelled us to sell our horses and camels, and then told us that unless we returned northward forthwith he could not guarantee

us transportation. Gen. Kitchener has sent 1,800 Soudanese, 200 men of the Cameron Highlanders, two batteries of Nordenfeldt mountain guns and several Maxims, on board the gunboats Sultan and Sheikh. The sirdar accompanies the

force on the steamer Dal. The correspondent says also, detailing an earlier movement, that the gunboat Sultan was sent up the Blue Nile to intercept a dervish garrison, ,500 strong, coming to reinforce the khalifa. The gunboat found and engaged the enemy, killing 1,000 and driving the remainder back. He adds: It is officially announced that khalifa is now surrounded and must be taken alive or dead within a few days.

### FEARFUL HAVOO

Caused by the Recent Cyclone in the West Indies.

Trinidad, British West Indies, Sept. 16.-A steamer which arrived here from Barbadoes reports that fearful havon was caused there by the hurricane on Saturday night. The destruction of property was immense. It is believed over 150 persons were killed throughout the island, and hundreds were rendered homeless and destitute. The shipping suffered seriously. The ship Loando, a bark and two barkentines broke from their anchorage and were driven to sea. They had not returned when the steamer left Barbadoes Many local vessels were wrecked or blown out to sea.

Bridgetown, the capital of the Island of Barbadoes, is a scene of desolation and ruin. Demolished or roofless houses are to be seen on every side, and hardly a tree is standing. Particulars from the country are still wanting.

country around for shelter and food. It appears that all the small buildings and many large ones were destroyed, and there is no doubt that the fatalities were numerous. Sir Cornelius Moloney, governor of the Windward Islands, cables that two vessels were sunk and that the fate of many others is unknown. ernor of Barbadoes, Sir J. S. Hay, reports that the hurricane was of ten hours' duration. Already he has been officially notified of 61 deaths and of 31 persons seriously wounded. The reports from the country districts are incomplete, but there has been a heavy loss of government and private prop-erty. Assistance is urgently required. St. Vincent, British West Indies. Sept. 16.—The official reports reduce the number of deaths here during the hurricane. It was at first estimated that

300 lives were lost, but is now believed the number is considerably smaller. The exact figures are not given. The ship Loanda and the bark Grace Lynwood were cast ashore at St. Vincent and wrecked.

The Novelist Not Surprised at What Has Happened.

Why He Left France-Will Be Heard

From Again. London, Sept. 16. - Although Emile Zola still maintains secrecy concerning his whereabouts, an intimate English friend, has seen him within the last fortnight, and elicited his views on the

present position of the Dreyfus ques-"Nothing that has happened has surprised me," Zola said. "I know of Henry's guilt, I knew that Esterhazy and Du Clam are equally guilty; I also knew that Dreyfus is perfectly innocent. There must be a new trial, with open doors; nothing else will suffice Should secrecy be reverted to, I shall be compelled to renew my campaign. respondent with the Anglo-Egyptian I shall intervene only if fresh attempts are made to strangle the truth, to rivet chains on the innocent, to shelter the guilty from the vengeance of the law. I know that the forms of law cause delay, and I shall bide my time in seclusion until justice is done, or there is fresh evidence that the reign of iniquity is to be revived. I am satisfied at present that France is struggling toward the light. There are difficulties in the shape of official influence and ministerial traditions to be overcome, but

they are being surmounted. "When I left France after the Versailles trial, it was not to desert the fray. It is true that I was not anxious to be shot lown by night in a ditch of Vincennes like another Duc d'Enghien, or be found, perhaps, in a cell, with my throat cut and a razor by my side; but the reason I left Paris was that might retain freedom of speech and action to pursue the work upon which I had entered. I am now free for that work. Had I remained in France I would have been at the mercy of conspirators, who know how to dispose of their enemies. If my presence within the French frontiers can aid the cause of truth, I shall be found there; otherwise I elect to remain in exile until the reign of justice is restored in my country. Victor Hugo remained 20 years an exile."

There is reason to believe that Zola's retreat is in the Austrian Tyrol. He is busily engaged on a new book, the first of a series of four, which will prove sequels to "Lourdes," "Rome," and "Paris." The first is entitled "Fecundity." and it will be finished next year. As to the reason for his maintaining ecrecy, Zola says: "If personal service of judgment against me by default had been made, I should have within a few days and entered an ap-pearance, or else the judgment would have become final and irrevocable. When revision is granted, and the whole truth is known, I shall claim a new trial. If my letters in the Aurora are still held by a jury to have been in excess of the necessities of the case, then I am prepared to accept whatever penalty the law imposes.
