COMING THIS WAY.

Progress of the Hurricane That Swept
the Windward Islands.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 16.—The hur-
ricane which swept the Windward Is-
lands Saturday last was encountered
on Sunday morning by the Norwegian
steamer Avona, which arrived here
yesterday afternoon. Capt. Frostad, the
master of the Avona, states there were
barometer indications before the storm
struck the vessel and he was, there-
fore, not unprepared to meet it, but it
was necessary to leave the vessel to
avoid serious consequences. The storm
sprang up from the southeast
early on Sunday and lasted until the
next day, when there was an intermis-
sion of about twelve hours. Then the hurricane
renewed with renewed vigor. Capt. Frostad believes
that many vessels foundered and will
never be heard from. 390

DANGER IN BARBER SHOPS.
Montreal, Sept. 16.—Central barbers
were hit today in a circular in-
sued by the local board of health, which
says: Beyond all doubt, anyone who
patronizes a barber or hair-dresser,
whose establishment is open to the
public, runs a great risk of becoming
infected by disease from the razor,
shaving brush, scissors, clippers, comb
or hair brush having been previously
used on a sick person, or even on a
corpse. At the present moment in the
whole Province of Quebec there is not
a single barber who can honestly say
that his instruments are absolutely
completely and scientifically safe in
regard to possibility of conveying in-
fection. The circular winds up by sug-
gesting precautions to be taken against
disease. 390

The French Have a
Strong Force at
Fashoda.

Said To Be Backed by 10,000
Abyssinians.

Gen. Kitchener Dispatches an
Expedition to the Scene.

The Barbadoes Hurricane Lasted
Ten Hours.

Assistance Urgently Needed by
Thousands of Homeless
People.

Salisbury Said To Have Backed Down
In Regard To The Chinese Railway
Deal—The Allans Likely To Get The
Fast Mail Contract.

London, Sept. 16.—Next to the high-
est balloon ascension on record was
made here yesterday afternoon from
the Crystal Palace, Sydenham, by
Stanley Spencer, the well-known aero-
naut, and Dr. Berson. The balloon,
which was inflated with pure hydro-
gen, and has a capacity of 55,500 cubic
feet, attained an altitude of 27,500 feet.
At a height of 25,000 feet the air was
so rarified that the occupants of the
car were compelled to breathe com-
pressed oxygen by tubes. The tem-
perature was 61 degrees below freez-
ing point. The atmosphere was clear
and the coast distinctly visible. The
balloon finally descended near Rom-
ford, in Essex. 390

A FUNERAL TRAIN.
Vienna, Sept. 16.—The funeral train
bearing the remains of the late Em-
peror of Austria entered the city on
Wednesday night. Everywhere there
were vast, silent crowds and the toll-
ing of bells. Many floral wreaths were
brought to the train to be placed on
the casket. The funeral train arrived
in Vienna at 10 o'clock. The whole
route of the procession was lined with
troops, and immense crowds, barehead-
ed, stood silently watching. 390

Among the wreaths, the one from
President McKinley attracts much at-
tention. It was the Stars and Stripes
intertwined, and bears the inscription
"From the President of the United
States—a tribute of heart-felt sym-
pathy to the memory of a noble and
gracious lady." All the festivities in
connection with the jubilee of Emperor
Francis Joseph have been completely
abandoned. The emperor will spend
six months in almost absolute retire-
ment, only attending to state busi-
ness. 390

A SPANISH REPORT.
Madrid, Sept. 16.—According to re-
ports from Manila, one-third of the
prisoners of Gen. Aguinaldo have died
of bad treatment. The peace com-
missioners will be appointed today. 390

CHINESE OUTRAGES.
London, Sept. 16.—The Shanghai cor-
respondent of the Daily News says re-
ports have been received there of se-
rious rioting at Ho Chao, 50 miles from
Chung King. The American and
British missions have been attacked,
and the latter burned. 390

THE TROUBLE AT CANDIA.
Candia, Island of Crete, Sept. 16.—An
aide-de-camp of Djovad Pasha boarded
the British flagship and announced
that 39 houses from which the British
troops had been fired upon had been
demolished, and that 113 of the ring-
leaders of the disturbances had been
arrested. Forty-three of the ring-
leaders who had been arrested were
delivered to the British admiral. 390

LORD SALISBURY SAID TO HAVE
VOTED.

London, Sept. 16.—The Pekin cor-
respondent of the Times says: Despite
Lord Salisbury's declaration that he
would brook no interference from any
other power in the Niu Chwang Rail-
way loan contract, he has now yielded
to all the conditions Russia im-
posed. As a result negotiations with
the English syndicate have been broken
off, and those with the Russian-
Chinese Bank have been resumed. 390

A KIND QUEEN.
Madrid, Sept. 15.—The queen regent
pays daily visits to the sick soldiers
who have returned from the colonies.
She has ordered the convalescents to
be conveyed in the royal carriages to
the Casa Del Campo, in the royal
park, and is paying from her own
pocket proper food for the invalids.
The correspondent here of the Associ-
ated Press has conversed with officers,
invalids and others who have returned
from Santiago de Cuba, and they
all extol the kindness of the Ameri-
cans in the surrendered city. They
do not display the slightest animosity
against the Americans, but entertain
bitter feelings against the Cubans. 390

FRENCH MINISTERIAL CRISIS.
Paris, Sept. 16.—Newspapers here
say the minister of justice, M. Sarrien,
has completed the examination of the
documents in the Dreyfus case. His
intention is to refer the matter to a
commission competent to undertake a
revision of the proceedings. The gen-
eral opinion is that the cabinet will
adopt the proposal for revision unani-
mously, with the exception of the
minister of war, Gen. Zurlinden, who
has informed the minister of justice
that he intended to resign if it should
develop he does not agree with his col-
leagues. 390

According to the Gaulois the result
of the decision of the minister of jus-
tice will be a ministerial crisis, as
other ministers will also resign.
THE AURANIA AT QUEENSTOWN.
Queenstown, Sept. 16.—The Cunard
line steamer Aurania (Capt. McKay),
from New York, Sept. 6, via Liverpool,
which was yesterday reported off the
south coast of Ireland disabled and in
tow, arrived here at 2 o'clock this
morning. The captain of the Aurania
reports that the crank shaft broke at
3:30 p.m. on Sept. 13. At 5:15 o'clock on
the following evening, while the steam-
er was 116 miles west of Fastnet, the
British steamer Marino (Capt. Web-
ster), from Montreal, Sept. 2, for Lon-
don, sighted the Aurania, and subse-
quently took her in tow. All on board
the Aurania are well. All the passen-
gers will be landed at this port, and
the steamer will be towed to Liverpool. 390

CABLE NOTES.
All Spanish war vessels have left
Porto Rican waters, in accordance with
peace protocol evacuation plans.
A picture of Halifax in 1750 has been
discovered in the British Museum.
A Canadian postage stamp, value
7½ pence, Halifax currency, or 6 pence
sterling, was sold by auction yester-
day, bringing £9, or 360 times its nor-
mal value. This stamp became obso-
lete in 1857. 390

At Lausanne, Switzerland, two ar-
rests have been made in connection
with the assassination on Saturday last
of the Empress Elizabeth of Austria.
One is a dangerous anarchist, who is
devised to have made the handle for
the file with which the empress was
murdered. The second is an anarchist,
charged with harboring Luchien, the
assassin, for several days. 390

The Financial News says the Allan
Steamship Company will probably se-
cure the contract for the fast Atlantic
steamers.
Every mail bring a large number of
letters from Canada which are over-
weight, and therefore entail the pay-
ment of double postage. Canadian
correspondents, it is said, never weigh
their letters, and thus cause much
inconvenience. 390

TRADE WITH BRITAIN.
Beneficial Effects of the Preferential
Tariff.

London, Sept. 16.—The British board
of trade returns for August show the
influence of the new Canadian tariff.
British exports to Canada increased 11
per cent during August and 15 per
cent for eight months. British exports
to all countries only increased 7½ per
cent, and decreased 3 per cent re-
spectively. British imports from Cana-
da increased 10 per cent for the
month and decreased 5 per cent for
the eight months. Imports from all
countries increased 11½ per cent for the
month and 5 per cent for the eight
months. The chief increase in imports
from Canada for the eight months
are: Butter, £73,000; eggs, £23,000;
fish, £145,000; wheat, £98,000; wheat
flour, £176,000; bacon, £318,000. The
chief decreases were: Hams, £2,000;
meats, £221,000; animals, £191,000;
metals, £18,000; wood, £810,000. 390
