Will Adopt Any Measures Deemed Expedient To Maintain Protectorate Over Egypt-Disorders Have Spread Throughout Entire Valley of the Nile.

London, March 21 .- Owing to the grave situation in Egypt, and London, March 21.—Owing to the grave situation in Egypt, and the presence of Gen. Sir F. Reginald Wingate, high commissioner for Egypt in London, Gen. Allenby, the commander of allied forces in Palestine, has been appointed special high commissioner for Egypt and the Soudan. He has been given supreme authority in all military and civil matters, and will take all expedient measures to restore order and maintain the protectorate over Egypt, according to an official announcement. Unofficial advices from Egypt show that the disorders in that country have spread through the whole valley of the Nile from Cairo to Assouan, and are being largely directed toward the destruction of railway and telegraph lines. The Reuter's telegram from Cairo, under date of March 15, stated that Cairo had been quiet for two days, with the exception of an incident in the Seyideh Zenab quarter, where an armored car fired on rioters, killing 13 and wounding 37. The situation in the provinces, however, was reported to be worse. Rioters are reported to have removed the rails between El Wasta and Rekkah, and to have sacked the station at Rekkah. Portland, Me., March 22 .- The hospital ship Araguaya arrived today from Liverpool with a detachment of 783 wounded Canadians, including 12 officers, on their way to military districts in Canada. Most of them are from Kirkdale Hospital at Liverpool, the others being from the Warrenton and Lenham Hospitals near that city. Of the total, 734 are convalescents, 83 are in very serious condition. There are two cases of total blindness.
