Italian and Jugo-Slav Repres entatives To Begin Negotiations Early in November-Allies Send Ultimatum To Hungary Demanding Treaty Ratification by Novem-

ROME, Oct. 29.—Direct negotiations will begin early in November between Italian and Jugo-Slav representatives to settle the Adriatic question, according to a semi-official note

A Rome dispatch on October 26 said the Italian council of ministers had decided to resume negotiations with the Jugo-Slavs concerning the Adriatic problem, in order to bring them to conclusion in one way or another before the reopening of Parliament, fixed for November 10.

The negotiations, it was said, would be conducted on Isola Bella, one of the Borromean Islands in the Bay of Tosa, and would have a two-fold aim-territorial and economic.



At his first trial, in June 1919, Cocchi declared his wife had committed the murder, and the trial was interrupted to determine the thruth or falsity of his charge. Mrs. Cocchi, however, was completely exonerated.

Leak in Spillway Threatened To Cause Serious Destruction.

SIMCOE. Oct. 29.—By vigilance, prompt action and splendid strategy the Norfolk Milling Company was saved thousands of dollars today, when the dam at the mill sprang a leak under the spillway at the eastern section.

The fire alarm was sent in, and citizens, including workmen on the sewer contract, rushed down. Bales of straw were effectually hurled into the water, which threatened to carry out the entire embankment under the spillway. A parapet of sand bags was then built outside of this, the bags being filled and passed in with incredible alacrity by volunteer workers, while the last gate of the west spillway and release gates were lifted by others. The erosion was arrested and the pond lowered below the danger point in less than half an hour. It was splendid work.

"Here is a man, claiming to be at war with England, whose coffin bore the legend: 'Murdered by the Foreigner,' borne along London streets with sympathizers carrying flags and declaring their enmity toward the people whose tolerance they enjoy," the Morning Post said. "In what other country would such tolerance be possible? Would America have tolerated in the streets of New York a demonstration in favor of secessionists? Would relatives of a murdered British soldier have been permitted a procession with Union Jacks in the streets of Cork or Dublin?"

"It was a most amazing example of English tolerance," the Daily Graphic said. "Picture thousands of rebels marching openly, guarded by police for their own protection! Such a procession would have been impossible in any other capital. The United States would not have tolerated it.
