WILL OPEN NEGOTIATIONS TO SETTLE ADRIATIC QUESTIONS

Italian and Jugo-Slav Representatives To Begin Negotiations Early in November—Allies Send Ultimatum To Hungary Demanding Treaty Ratification by November 15.

ROME, Oct. 29.—Direct negotiations will begin early in November between Italian and Jugo-Slav representatives to settle the Adriatic question, according to a semi-official note issued today.

A Rome dispatch on October 26 said the Italian council of ministers had decided to resume negotiations with the Jugo-Slavs concerning the Adriatic problem, in order to bring them to a conclusion in one way or another before the reopening of Parliament, fixed for November 10.

The negotiations, it was said, would be conducted on Isola Bella, one of the Borromean Islands in the Bay of Tosa, and would have a two-fold aim—territorial and economic.

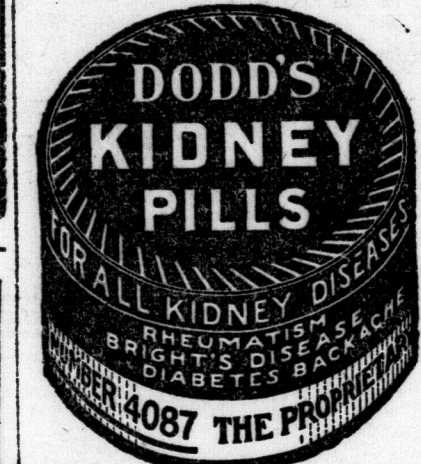
ULTIMATUM TO HUNGARY.

PARIS, Oct. 29.—The Allies have sent a note to the Hungarian Government, demanding ratification of the Treaty of Trianon not later than November 15, it was learned today. In the event that no action is taken by that time, the note points out, "certain consequences" will result. A law providing for ratification has been introduced in the Hungarian Parliament.

After Nearly Four Years Law Brings Criminal To Justice—Conviction On Four Charges Results On Sentence of Twenty-Seven Years.

BOLOGNA, Italy, Oct. 29.—Alfredo Cocchi, on trial here for the murder of Ruth Cruger in New York City in February, 1917, was today found guilty on four charges.

The prosecution asked Cocchi's conviction for murder in the first degree, attempted criminal assault, falsifying passports and false enrollment in the military service. Cocchi was sentenced to 27 years imprisonment.

OPEN VERDICT IS RETURNED BY JURY IN SULLIVAN DEATH

No Fresh Light Shed On Woman's Prior Movements At Inquest.

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 29.—Nothing of an important character was developed at the adjourned inquest tonight into the facts leading up to the death of Maggie Sullivan, colored woman of London, who was found with her neck broken and her body crushed, below the Pere Marquette bridge on Sunday, October 10.

The remains had been lying under the structure for three or four days and were badly decomposed. They were identified by her brother-in-law, Mr. Harris of London, some days after the finding of the body.

The jury gave an open verdict and found that the deceased was last seen on October 7. And the body was found under the north side of the Pere Marquette bridge near the west entrance in the township of Yarmouth. The jury further said that death must have been caused by a broken neck and other injuries.

SPLendid WORK SAVED DAM OF THE NORFOLK MILLING CO.

Leak in Spillway Threatened To Cause Serious Destruction.

[Special To The Advertiser.] SIMCOE, Oct. 29.—By vigilance, prompt action and splendid strategy the Norfolk Milling Company has saved thousands of dollars today, when the dam at the mill sprang a leak under the spillway at the eastern section.

Arch. Everett, one of the employees, noticed the small leak at 12:30, showed the manager at once and immediately began to raise the gates. The fire alarm was sent in and citizens, including workmen on the sewer contract, rushed down. Bales of straw were effectively hurled into the water, which threatened to carry out the entire embankment under the spillway. A parapet of sand bags was then built outside of this, the bags being filled and passed in with incredible alacrity by volunteer workers. LIBERALS, LABOR IGNORE DEBATE ON IRISH BILL

Measure Passes Through the Committee Stage Without Opposition.

NO MILITARY DISPLAY

British Government Bans Uniforms At MacSwiney Funeral.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—The Irish home rule bill was passed through committee stage in the House of Commons today without further important amendment. Some important modifications are intended by the Government, including the question of making candidates for Parliament take the oath of allegiance. These were postponed during the report stage of the bill. The discussion in committee throughout have been quiet, in view of the fact that the Labor and Liberal members declined to participate in the committee sessions.

CLAIMS FUNERAL SHOWS TOLERANCE

TORONTO, Oct. 29.—Special Cable to the Star.—The London press today declared that the orderliness of the MacSwiney funeral exposed the hollow claims of Sinn Féin of ruthless tyranny in the government of Ireland. Here is a man, claiming to be at the head of a revolution, who is declaring that his emigrants toward the people whose tolerance they enjoy, the people of the United States, would have such tolerance be possible? Would America have tolerated the streets of New York or demonstration in favor of secessionists? Would relatives of a murdered British soldier have been permitted a procession with Union Jacks in the streets of Cork or Dublin?

"It was a most amazing example of English tolerance," the Daily Graphic said. "Picture thousands of rebels marching openly, guarded by police, for their own protection! Such a procession would have been impossible in any other capital. The United States would not have tolerated it. If Debs were to die of self-murder as MacSwiney did, and such a procession were attempted it would have been broken up by the Irish policemen of New York City."

ARREST SPANIARDS FOR IRISH DEMONSTRATION

MADRID, Oct. 29.—Three arrests of Catalan Nationalists have been made in connection with the demonstration carried out at Barcelona yesterday by students in front of the British Consulate here, who chanted "Ireland, free Catalonia and shout 'Down with England!' and 'Down with the windows of the consulate, when their demands for an interview with the consul were denied."

REMAINS ARRIVE. CORK, Ireland, Oct. 29.—The body of Terence MacSwiney, former lord mayor, arrived here at 4 o'clock on an admiralty tug, flying her flag at half mast. Enormous crowds lined the quays and nearby bridges.

The government authorities in Cork immediately notified Lord Mayor O'Callaghan and the Bishop of Cork that no military display would be permitted in connection with the funeral of MacSwiney, and that neither drilling, uniforms nor republican army badges would be allowed.

The funeral party, which refused to board the packet Rathmore at Holyhead, arrived in Cork shortly before 7 o'clock this evening.

TORONTO, Oct. 29.—It is stated that following the reorganization of the fish and game branch under the Hon. E. B. Biebs, the Ontario Government is to transfer that branch from the department of public works to the department of mines and forests.
