**PRICES OF WHEAT SUFFER DECLINES**

Peace Rumors and More Favorable Argentine Reports Cause Uneasiness.

**VESEL RATES FALL**

Cheaper Freight Charges to South America Influence Chicago Market.

Chicago, Oct. 6.—Peace rumors and bearish advices regarding Argentine crop outlook resulted today in a series of downward swings in the value of wheat. The market closed heavy, 2 1/2- to 5-8c net lower, with December at \$1.57 5-8 and 1 1/2- and May at \$1.57 1-8. Corn finished 3-4c to 1-3-4c off and oats down 1-5c to 1-4c. Provisions scored gains ranging all the way from a shade to 8c.

Suggestions of a likelihood of show-ups in Argentina made the wheat bulls uneasy from the start, as heretofore no sign has been reported of the break-up of the drought which has been forcing Europeans of late to enlarge buying in the United States. Quotations at Buenos Ayres tended to favor the bears, and so, too, did a decline in vessel rates from South America, with consequent increased shipments. Selling here, however, did not attain unusual proportions until the final half of the session, when gossip as to a new attempt at negotiations for peace added to the pressure on the market, and resulted in the summary closing out of numerous holdings.

Incredulity as to the truth of the peace rumors prevented wheat from breaking much beyond ordinary limits, except in the case of the July option, in which trading as yet is relatively light. For a brief interval July was down just six cents a bushel. Export buying on the set-back appeared active, but it was said the British Government and its allies would not hereafter give out any information regarding purchases of breadstuffs. Early firmness was based chiefly on the relative cheapness of oats as compared with corn.

Diminished receipts of hogs tended to lift provisions. The most active demand came from shorts.

**GRAPE PREPONDERANT**

Very Few Peaches Offered and Bulk Was of Poor Quality.

**PICKLING ONIONS OFFERED**

Majority on Sale Are the Large Size and Not So Readily Picked Up.

Receipts were fairly heavy on the wholesale fruit market yesterday, grapes predominating; prices remaining about stationary. Apples, peaches and pears.

There were very few choice peaches offered, the bulk again being very poor quality; six-quart flats sold at 20c and 25c; six-quart lemons at 25c to 30c, with very few of extra choice quality bringing 30c and 60c. The 11-quart flats at 30c to 60c and 11-quart lemons at 10c to \$1; a very few bringing 12c.

Fruits were only shipped very lightly and sold at 50c to 55c for 11-quart basket; some choice peaches bringing 10c to 12c, and Damsons \$1.25 per 11-quart basket.

Quinces were not of very good quality yesterday and sold at 70c to 10c per 11-quart basket. Some choice peaches brought 10c to 12c, and Damsons \$1.25 per 11-quart basket.

The bulk of the pickling onions now being received are the large size, and do not sell at 4c, but at 3c to 4c. They sold yesterday at \$1 per 11-quart basket; the very best bringing \$1.25 to \$1.50, and a very few \$1.75 per 11-quart basket.

McWilliam & Everist had a car of mostly Gravenstein, selling at \$3.50 to \$4 per bushel, for No. 2's and 1's—also three quarts, selling at \$1.65 per bag and one quart, selling at \$1.50 per bag.

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Stronach & Sons had a car of mixed fruit, including peaches, apples, and pears. They sold yesterday at \$1 per 11-quart basket; the very best bringing \$1.25 to \$1.50, and a very few \$1.75 per 11-quart basket.

**MINES HOLD STEADY**

ON ACTIVE TRADING  
 Dome Lake Advanced and Eased Off—Later—Ophir Scored Gain.

Active trading was again the order at the Standard Stock Exchange yesterday and on the whole stocks were about steady and changes in prices were small either way. In spots there seemed to be a disposition to liquidate, but a good demand sprang up on recessions. The rather quiet, Davison was one of the firm stocks on the Forcupine list, selling up to 49 3/4 again.

A feature of the trading was Dome Lake, which advanced on good buying to a new high of 62 and closed off again on profit-taking to 60. Dome was one of the most active issues on the board. Hollinger Consolidated was steady at 66.85 and further eased off further to 27. McIntyre was very dry, selling at \$1.45 to \$1.46 for a couple of odd lots.

One of the latest additions to the board, Forcupine Bonanza, displayed some activity with an earlier tendency, selling back from 14 1/2 to 13 3/4. Vipera, the other hand, gained a little, going up to 38.

Newray continued to show strength, selling all day at 76 to 77. Teck Hughes went to 42 and closed at 42. West Dome Consolidated displayed an early tendency to recover some of its loss of the previous day, selling up to 36 1/2, but ceased off again and closed at 35 1/4 bid. There seems to be no explanation for the liquidation of Dome, which was reported from the property, which are being made to erect a mill this fall, for which there are sufficient funds in the treasury.

Silver was quoted at 88 1/4, but the Cobalts, beyond remaining comparatively steady, showed little response. Vancouver was reported from the property as being in good demand for some days past, advanced to 12 ex-dividend, Timiskaming held at 61 1/2 and Beaver at 42 1/2.

Great Northern, which was a feature on the preceding day, quieted down a little, selling off 1-2 point on profit-taking and rallying again to 7 1/2.

Peterson Lake eased off to 23 3/4 on the close.

Northern Gas continued to show a strong tendency, selling thruout at the high, established on the preceding day at 45.

**CROSSCUT AT OPHIR**

The vein, which they are crosscutting towards, is one of the largest and strongest veins in southeast. Coleman and it is generally expected amongst the engineering fraternity that it will be only a matter of drifting on the vein to find high-grade veins.

It was evidently the anticipation of the completion of this crosscutting which caused an active demand for Ophir stock today. **BRADSTREET'S TRADE REPORT.**

Toronto reports to Bradstreet's show that mercantile business is fairly good, and that the general feeling is optimistic. Trade is considerably ahead of last year. Even in the absence of war orders, one prominent drygoods man said the general feeling was substantially ahead of that of last year when government orders were being ordered up as rapidly as the goods could be produced. He said that he had no cause for complaint. In the hardware trade, orders in connection with munition firms are proving the greatest source of activity. Staples are being sold better than a couple of months ago, and there is a noticeable difference between last week's trade and that of August. The grocery trade is reported as being fairly active. Sugars advanced 10c a hundred on Wednesday. Dry goods lines are active with particularly being scarce. Ontario winter wheat advanced during the week and sold as high as \$1.55 a bushel affected by the price of Manitoba wheat. Butter and eggs went higher, and the tone of the general trade was distinctly firmer. Cheese boards were distinctly
