"THE BOHEMIAN GIRL"

A passenger list that read like a page from "The Arabian Nights," was carried by a ship which sailed from Cairo a few years ago bringing a small regiment of Arab soldiers. COURT TO INVESTIGATE CANAL PATROL FURTHER

KINGSTON, Ont., Aug. 31.—There is a possibility that the court of enquiry presided over by Major General Smith, judge advocate-general, will be reopened in the near future. The court has been sitting at the armories for the last three days conducting an extensive investigation into the affairs of the St. Lawrence Canal patrol. It was found, however, that the scope of the enquiry was too limited. The finding of the court will not be made public, according to the officers.
