CUSTOMS REACH HIGH AUGUST MARK
Approximately Three Million Dollars Received, Setting Record.
MUNITIONS ARE CAUSE
Steady Gain of Millions in Last Two Years' Receipts.

Represented by nearly three million dollars the customs figures for Toronto for the month of August, announced yesterday, show that the revenue for this month is the greatest of any August in the history of Toronto. increase of half a million over the revenue of July this year, but this is usual as July is the month between the spring and fall seasons and never produces records. The increase is attributed to the shipments of war material.

A comparison of the years 1915 and 1916, ending August 31, shows that the total gain for 1916 is twelve and a half million dollars, and the total of thirty millions, for this year to the end of August, is far in excess of any figures ever handed out by the custom house officials.

The following are the figures for the months of July and August for the two years: August, 1916, \$2,900,000; July, 1916, \$2,315,973; August, 1915, \$1,611,606 and August, 1914, \$1,684,122.

The total results for the year ending August 31, 1915, were \$17,500,000 and for the year ending August 31, 1916, \$30,000,000.
