CLOTHIERS REQUEST REVISION OF ORDERS FIXING THEIR PROFITS

REPORTS FROM STATES

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 15.—(By the Canadian Press)—Representatives of the clothiers' section of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada, waited upon Judge Robson, chief commissioner of the board of commerce, this morning and presented a resolution, passed unanimously at a meeting of the Dominion board of the association, asking for amendments to the order respecting ready-to-wear and partly made suits and overcoats.

WANT EXCEPTIONS

The resolution asks that the order limiting the gross profit to 23-1/3 per cent. of the sale price shall not apply to suits or overcoats of extreme style, such as fancy suits, waist line, dress frock, morning suits and such like models.
