CLOSE AT MONTREAL AND GOOD LACROSSE

Shamrocks and Montreal in Fast Game on Latter's Grounds.

M.A.A.A. GROUNDS, Montreal, June 10.—(Special to The Sunday World.)—The first game between two home teams was pulled off on the M.A.A.A. grounds this afternoon, when the Shamrocks and Montreal met in a N.L.A. fixture.

Neither team can afford to lose today's game if they want to be in the running for championship honors, especially the Shamrocks, and considerable interest was manifested in this first time this season.

There has been a cloudy sky all day, but it did not have any serious effect in keeping the crowd away.

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Shipping Merger Of Inland Lines

Six Big Companies Are Involved—New Corporation Is Called Great Lakes Steamship.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 10.—One of the largest steamship mergers in the history of the great lakes navigation was successfully carried out here yesterday, when five companies joined a combination which will be known as the Great Lakes Steamship Co.

The concerns involved in the transaction are the United States Transportation Co., the L. C. Smith Transit Co., the Wilkinson Transportation Co., the Standard Transportation Co., and the American Transit Co.

The new concern will have a paid-in capital of \$8,000,000, and a bond issue of \$1,500,000, bearing interest at 6 per cent. And payable in amounts of \$150,000 annually during the next ten years.

About 21 freight vessels are involved in the deal. The Guardian Savings and Trust Co. of Cleveland is named trustee and depositary.

WHAT'S IN A NAME.

OTTAWA, June 10.—Ezra Butler Eddy Bessey of Ottawa will seek legislation at the next session of parliament changing his name to Ezra Butler Eddy. He is a grandson of the late E. B. Eddy, the millionaire match king, and it seems that under the latter's will certain bequests were conditional upon Mr. Bessey changing his name to Eddy on reaching his majority.

ARGYLE TO GRIMSBY

The steamer Argyle, remodeled and refitted for the season, starts on Tuesday a regular service to Whitby, Bowmanville and Newcastle, and on Wednesday to Grimsby Beach. The steamer will run four days a week to the south shore resort, unless the many pleases which have booked demand more trips. She will be the first steamer to dock at Grimsby Park for many years.

Hotelkeepers File Receipts. Hotelkeepers had until yesterday to file the first monthly statement of receipts, under the recent amendment to the License Act. There is an exemption of \$50 per day for bars out of Toronto and \$80 per day for local bars.

REV. DR. LUCAS DEAD

Had World-wide Fame as Temperance Advocate.

HAMILTON, June 10.—(Special.)—Rev. Daniel Lucas, D.D., well-known throughout the Dominion as a leading temperance advocate, died at the city hospital this morning.

The late Dr. Lucas was born near this city 77 years ago, and graduated from the Wesleyan College. A great deal of his actual life in the pastorate was spent in western Canada, while much of his work as a temperance advocate was performed in Australia.

LUTHERAN SYNOD IN SESSION

Many Delegates Here From United States—Jubilee Celebration To-day.

The Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Canada met in annual session Thursday and Friday of last week at the German Lutheran Church, Bond-street, and was attended by about one hundred pastors and delegates from the Province of Ontario. Besides these a goodly number of representatives of Lutheran synods of the United States were present and partook in the deliberations.

Rev. J. E. Hoffman of Berlin was re-elected as president, and Rev. Dr. C. C. H. Mats of Zurich as vice-president. The reports showed much progress everywhere, and the missionary work was hopeful.

In connection with this session the Canada Synod celebrates its golden jubilee, and the home organization its 60th anniversary to-day.

Thursday night the synod as such was banqueted by the home church at the King Edward. The members of the synod were treated to a sight-seeing tour of the city.

The sessions will continue until the 13th inst.
