wood with the powder. Darling tells us that the death-mask was taken on May 7, some forty hours after Napoleon's death, by Drs. Burton and Antourmarchi, and afterwards a cast was taken of fore and knife, a silver ewer or cream jug, a silver canister with a top to it, coins as well as the dishes containing the time it was taken and the rough material. In his work, "Napoleon in Exile, St. Helena, 1815-1821," Mr. Norwood Young says that Burton, desiring to take a mask himself, tried to get the raw material in James Town, but could not, and sent a fleet of fishing ships to get gypsum, the base of plaster of Paris. Burton then took his preparation to the death chamber, but Dr. Antonmarchi had tried the Darling material, and failed, and Burton's gypsum succeeded. Darling says Burton and Antonmarchi made the cast from his plaster under his own eyes.

Many Coffins Used.

Taking instructions for the lying-instate, he got a cartful of materials and a posse of men and arrived at "The Wood" at midnight. They worked until half-past three in the morning, rested, and by daylight were at work again. Early in the forenoon General Montholon allowed Darling to have a look at the body: The upholsterer was astonished to "see him so much wasted in the body, but at the same time looking so well, so young, and with such a pleasin rountenance." Them came the order for the coffins, and the measurements given by Montholon were: Net size of body—length five feet seven inches, only eighteen inches across the shoulders, and scarcely ten inches deep. Darling says of the coffin: "The, description of the coffins were to be, first, tin, lined with satin, which was to be stuffed with cotton, a small mattress and pillow of the same materials on the bottom of ditto; then, third, a lead coffin; and then one of mahogany, covered with crimson velvet. If it could be procured; but I told them there was not any on the island I could get, as I had been in search of some a few days before; it was then settled that the outer coffin should be of the best mahogany that was on the island, which was accordingly done." Other accounts, official included, of the disinternment when the body was removed to Paris are that the second coffin was mahogany like the outer, and Norwood Young says that "the tin coffin was enclosed in a shell of mahogany made by Metcalife, a cabinet-maker."
