HAVELOCK ELLIS ON WAR LESSONS. (Toronto Mail and Empire.) Havelock Ellis, a noted English writer, has presented his views as to what will happen, and what ought to be made to happen, after the war is over.

As Mr. Ellis says, some of the neutral countries have been hardly less affected than some of the belligerents. For instance, the United States is more concerned in this war than Japan, or probably than Italy will be should she decide to become belligerent.

Moreover, it is becoming clearer that the vigor and power of resistance of small nationalities, so far from diminishing, are increasing with our social progress. There will be no peace in the world until the safety and independence of the small nations are absolutely guaranteed.
