

LONDON EXPERT MAY VISIT HERE

**Dr. R. E. Wodehouse Speaks
of Fight Against White
Plague**

**Sir Henry Gauvin May Attend
Medical Society Meeting in
Moncton Next Year.**

**U. S. Naval Commander

If the executive of the New Brunswick Medical Society so desires there is a possibility that the eminent tuberculosis expert from London, Sir Henry Gauvin, may attend the annual meeting of the society to be held in Moncton in 1926, his visit being at the expense of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association. Should the visit be arranged, Dr. Gauvin will discuss the treatment of tuberculosis by heliotherapy or sun rays.

The announcement regarding Dr. Gauvin was made by Dr. R. E. Wodehouse, secretary of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association when he spoke before the medical society in Moncton on Tuesday evening. Dr. Wodehouse is now in Saint John, a guest at the Admiral Beatty Hotel. Accompanied by Dr. G. W. Wherrett, provincial diagnostician, Dr. Wodehouse has been visiting Riverview sanatorium. He will visit the County Hospital in Saint John and afterwards will go to Kentville and Halifax.

HIGH DEATH RATE
Dr. Wodehouse yesterday spoke of what the Canadian Association has been doing in the Maritime Provinces this summer in the fight against tuberculosis. The tuberculosis death rate in the three Maritime Provinces he said was among the four highest provincial tuberculosis death rates of Canada, and those associated with anti-tuberculosis work in the three provinces are quite cognizant of the fact and anxious to follow the most helpful programme to rectify conditions.

The Canadian Association has obtained the privilege of bringing its methods and the results being obtained in other provinces before the medical men in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island and had financed a visit to Prince Edward Island and this summer of a tuberculosis chest diagnostician, Dr. Clare Brink with a technician and a portable X-ray outfit. The diagnostician and technician had visited different centres and their services had been used by the medical men in excess of the capacity of the diagnostician. The visit had culminated in the drawing up of a plan of campaign covering five years of work which was placed before the P. E. I. Government and is being given careful consideration, which it is expected will be quite favorable.

PUBLIC MEETINGS

Dr. Wodehouse said that in the Canadian Association's program several public meetings and a further programme will be developed under the auspices of the New Brunswick Tuberculosis Association, probably in October. The last two weeks of August are to be spent in the province of Nova Scotia and it is hoped to arrange a maritime conference in the last week of August. At this conference it is hoped to have present the minister from the provincial government, who is in charge of the administration of the department of health, and tuberculosis treatment institutions, one medical expert from each of those institutions and the health departments. If possible this conference will be arranged to take place in Prince Edward Island under the chairmanship of Premier Stewart.

REDUCTION POSSIBLE

With reference to the high tuberculosis death rate in these provinces Dr. Wodehouse said that it was thought that suitable methods and equipment,

as to treatment, beds and personal, as well as to the provision of free treatment for indigents suffering from the disease would bring about in the Maritime Provinces, the same reduction of death rates that has been obtained through these methods elsewhere.

Rate Cut Ordered For Smokeless Coal

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12—Railroads serving West Virginia smokeless coal districts were ordered by the Interstate Commerce Commission to lay down a new basis of rates which will allow movement of such coal to consuming territory including all of New England and North Atlantic seaboard.

The commission refused to order general rate reductions on anthracite and possible substitutes for anthracite. Decision was taken after an investigation of several months.

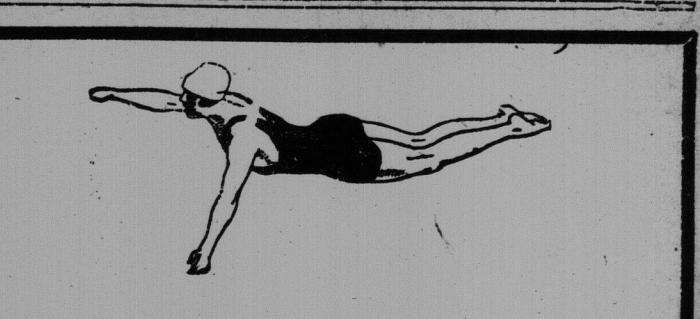
