After making 100 points on a rail race, the balls spread on him frequently while he was putting together the remainder of the points. This necessitated his making several around-the-table shots, a number of spread draws and a whole flock of one, two and three cushion caroms. Time and again he was counselled to stop shooting while the big crowd burst into prolonged applause.

### MANAGERS OF MAJOR LEAGUE TEAMS ANXIOUS

Both Huggins and Robinson Seeking Light on Renewal of Their Contracts — Why Cobb Will Not Manage Detroit.

(New York Times.)

Within the space of another week it is expected that two questions of considerable importance to baseball fans of Greater New York will be settled. One concerns the possibility of Miller Huggins being superseded as manager of the Yankees and the other revolves around Wilbert Robinson, who led the Brooklyn team to a National League pennant during the season just closed.

Both leaders are anxious to learn definitely whether or not they are to be re-engaged for the 1921 season in order that no real opportunity will be passed up while waiting for word that may not come. Huggins came to New York during the winter series, after making a brief visit with friends in Rochester, in order to have a conference with his employers. He reported that he was in Cleveland for the big series, and that he was in the hands of his employers. At the same time it is known that he is somewhat concerned over the numerous stories that have been written about another manager being appointed for the 1921 season.

Since arriving at his home, Huggins has been quoted as saying that he had no intention of resigning as manager of the Yankees and that his fate was in the hands of his employers. ##### Owners are Reluctant.

Colonels Ruppert and Huston are saying nothing about the managerial situation except that Huggins is still in charge of the playing end of the club. There was some disappointment over the failure of the Yankees to come through with the pennant after taking the lead in mid-September, but whether the owners believe Huggins is in any way responsible for the failure only time will tell. The two Colonels are saying not a word that would suggest to the public that they are dissatisfied with the managerial ability of the mite manager. With important baseball meetings looming up in the next few days, it would not be surprising if Huggins gets into communication with his employers during the next two or three days, to see whether he should start work on the 1921 Yankees or look to other fields.

##### The Case of Manager Robinson.

The case of Manager Robinson is a different one. The leader of the National league champions is in high favor with his employers and with the fans, and there apparently is no tendency to consider anybody else for the position. But Robinson is said to be asking for a contract somewhat in excess of the one under which he has been working. His former contract has expired and he is about to sign a new one. It is a question of agreeing upon terms that is delaying the signing of the new contract. Unless his employers decide that the figure is too high.

Having won two pennants in the last five years Robinson undoubtedly would be in a position to come to terms with the club if he failed to find one to terms with the Brooklyn club. He came to New York Friday from his home in Baltimore to find out quickly about his prospects of being re-engaged. He wants a definite answer soon and he probably will get it during the coming week. The absence of the McKee brothers, who own half of the Brooklyn club, is a factor in the delay. They are expected to return to the city Friday when they will have a long conference with President C. H. Ebbets.

##### Cobb Prefers to Wait.

The fact that Ty Cobb is the star player of the Detroit club has led some of the dopest to advance the theory that he is the likely successor to Hugh Jennings as boss of the Tigers, but according to information from Detroit it is not likely to be the 1921 manager of the club. One reason is that Ty has no ambition to become a manager until his playing days are ended and that is still some distance away. Another reason is that President Frank J. Whelan undoubtedly feels that the naming of Cobb as team leader at this time, if Cobb did not want the place, would not be a wise one.
