OVER THE WIRES

At yesterday's Unionist caucus in Ottawa it was said by western members that they were not in favor of Canada taking part in an extensive naval policy at present, that box cars were wanted just now more than battleships.

The Prince of Wales left yesterday for Portsmouth to sail aboard the cruiser Renown for his tour of Australia.

The Commons at Ottawa yesterday discussed the Bulgarian peace treaty. Hon. Mackenzie King asked several questions as to the status of Canada, contending that the Canadian parliament with the concurrence of the provinces should have the power to amend her own constitution.

At a meeting of the Farmers' and Dairy-men's Association in Fredericton yesterday, the president, C. F. Alward, of Havelock, N. B., gave an address which contained many suggestions for improvement of rural life. The problem as to education, he said, was largely based upon the question of teachers' salaries.

The Howard Smith Paper Mills of Montreal are reported to have acquired
