U. S. HORSEMEN ACCEPT INVITATION
Will Compete on Maritime and Maine Short Ship Circuit — St. John Horses to Train at Fredericton.

(Fredericton Mail.)
Secretary Hugh O'Neill of the Fredericton Trotting Park Association has received a letter from Frank P. Fox, dean of the horsemen who made their headquarters at Comblin Park, Medford, Mass., to the effect that he had consulted all the owners of horses in the stable relative to the invitation extended to him to campaign on the Maritime and Maine Short Ship Circuit, and all has expressed willingness. This means that Mr. Fox will race in the maritime provinces this season. He expressed an intention of opening at Fredericton and then going into Maine, but Secretary O'Neill pointed out that the maritime provinces offered just as good a field. The Fox stable containing six horses is expected to arrive in Fredericton in June. With other tracks putting on classes satisfactory to Mr. Fox he will follow the circuit from here. He wanted to include a 210 pace included, but the free-for-all will suit his horse as well.

The coming of the Fox stable probably will mean that the owners of the horses and their families will spend the summer in the maritime provinces. This is the first season since the barring of American horses from maritime tracks that the Fox stable has visited the maritime provinces.

Another well known horseman who will race at Fredericton and other places in the maritime provinces is Irving Potte of Portland, Me., who is expected to bring twelve horses.

A number of New Brunswick stables which are to train at the Fredericton track are to arrive here next week. They include St. John horses and those of Dr. McAllister of Sussex.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES
