THE WAR IN MONCTON

The Scott Act fight in Moncton was warm. The Transcript charges that a hotel keeper went last week to city hall and asked for a list of the poll-tax payers, and that the purpose is to make a selected list, pay their taxes and get them to vote for a mayor and aldermen favorable to the liquor interests. The Transcript says: "The proposal is to do in Moncton that which was done in Fredericton. The wholesale liquor interests of St. John will contribute towards a fund and into the city coffers will be paid the difference between the poll tax and the lowest amount which would qualify for a vote. The difference in Moncton will be slightly less than \$25. A hundred votes at that rate manufactured in this way would only cost the liquor interests \$250, and this money properly distributed among the poll tax payers and qualifying a certain selected list would practically place the balance of power in the civic elections in the hands of the liquor sellers. What is the result? To control the election of the mayor, to elect a mayor, who may give the balance of power in the police commission against the temperance people."
