## PREPARE FOR BIG MEET

Joint Teams Representing Oxford  
and Cambridge, Harvard and  
Yale

Cambridge, Mass., March 1.—Tentative plans for an international intercollegiate track and field meeting between joint teams representing Harvard and Yale, and Oxford and Cambridge, have been drawn up.

The only disagreement now in sight is as to the date of the proposed competition. The Harvard stadium will be the place of meeting, and June 19 is the date suggested by Harvard and Yale, but the English authorities would prefer to come here to compete during the first week in July. Captain Cummings of the Harvard track team today said that he did not anticipate much difficulty over the date.

There will be eleven events, the 100 yard dash, 440 yard dash, 120 yard hurdles, high jump, broad jump, hammer throw, 880 yard run, mile run, three mile run and two of the following three events: 220 yard dash, 200 yard hurdles or shot put.

Russia's Pressure on Finland

Two Thousand to Sing  
IN MIGHTY BRITISH CHOR  
AT BELGIAN EXHIBITION  
London, March 1.—A great British choir is to visit Belgium. This interesting announcement is made in connection with the Imperial Exhibition. This mammoth organization, founded by Dr. Charles Haries, representing forty or more London choirs, which opened the Empire Festival in 1910 and the Shakespeare Exhibition last year, has been invited by the Belgian government to appear at the Ghent Universal and International Exhibition next May.

The Imperial Choir on this occasion will consist of 2,000 singers, and they will give two concerts entirely of British music. The concerts will take place in the Grand Halle des Petes. The choir will be the guests of the city during their stay in Ghent. The full strength of the Imperial Choir is 4,200 voices.
