## EMMERSON WILL HAVE A GREATER VOTE THAN EVER

His Campaign in Westmorland Has Opened With Great Success

### OPPONENT LITTLE KNOWN

Liberal Candidate Will Receive Great Popular Vote as Well as General Reciprocity Support—Sir Wilfrid's Coming Brings Striking Answer to Tory Critics

Moncton, Aug. 28.—With the splendid rally in the interests of Hon. Mr. Emerson in the Grand Opera house last week, the campaign in Moncton was opened in a manner that was exceedingly gratifying to Liberals. The opening rally here was very largely attended and the meeting was an enthusiastic one, notwithstanding the effort of the Tory press to belittle the demonstration.

Liberals are going into the campaign with vim and enthusiasm which was made very apparent when Hon. Mr. Emerson made his first appearance during the campaign on the public platform. Hundreds of his admirers arose and cheered loudly and they generously applauded him as he made point after point in favor of the great policy upon which the government has gone to the country.

Mr. Emerson is appealing to the people on broad, statesmanlike lines. He regards reciprocity as a business proposition and he believes that it will be good business for the people to accept the agreement. "This is a different election from any I have ever run," he says. "Don't vote for me, as Emerson," he asks, but vote for yourselves. Mr. Emerson made a hit with the electioneers when he asked them to let him continue his services at Ottawa in carrying out the C. R. branch line policy. "Let Emerson finish his work," has become a slogan that is meeting with a hearty response in Westmorland. In addition to the popularity of reciprocity in this constituency, Mr. Emerson's faithful service in the interests of his constituents and the country generally in connection with the international will not soon be forgotten.

It will be an important factor in returning him to the federal capital with a majority that will give him added K-A Striking Contrast.

**Daily Hints For the Cook**  
RAISIN BREAD  
Cover two cups of seedless raisins and two cups of rolled oats with boiling water. Cook in double boiler to a thick porridge and until raisins are plump and tender. Then add one tablespoonful of lard and one of salt, one cup of cooking molasses and one pint of water. Soak one yeast cake in a little water. When ingredients are cool add yeast. Mix with flour into a smooth dough. Let rise over night. In the morning mold into pans. Let rise and bake. Turn each loaf in melted lard when removed from oven. This process makes a tender crust.

## CONSERVATIVES TURN BACKS TO FOSTER IN NORTH TORONTO

Many Will Vote for Liberal Candidate Because of the Opposition Man's Record

Toronto, Aug. 26.—At an enthusiastic Liberal convention in North Toronto last night, there was a steady chronicle of votes for staunch Conservative electors of the riding who had renounced the party allegiance, which required the support of the present Conservative candidates. Some had declared their intention to refrain from voting; others had boldly besought their first Liberal vote, John A. Paterson told the delegates of Conservatives who had decided they could not support Mr. Foster on the present occasion when he stood sponsor for the "Intolerable Bourgeois Alliance." Then came C. W. Kerr, who found other North Toronto Conservatives who were prepared to sink party differences in the present contest.

W. H. Shaw told how he had received "scores of communications from Conservative friends," tendering their support. A. E. Dymott instanced the case of four, two of them sons of one of Toronto's wealthiest and most esteemed Conservatives, a man who employed about 1,000 hands. Finally came C. W. Hartman, who declared he had yesterday been assured of the co-operation of "one of the ablest and largest financiers in Canada" who told him that he recognized that if the Conservative party should win and George E. Foster take the position of minister of finance, he could forthwith write twenty-five per cent off his assets. He said the matter was a serious one for the credit of Canada.

**Mr. Shaw Nominated**  
North Toronto Liberals do not lack leaders. In all eight nominations were made, each greeted with hearty applause. But the feeling of the other gentlemen named was that W. H. Shaw, who tackled Mr. Foster in 1906 and held his majority down to a scant 388, should be permitted to "finish his work."
