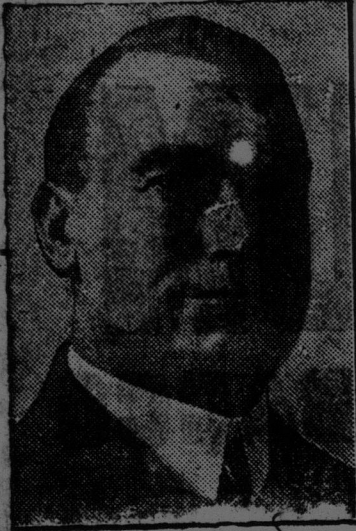

RUSH FOR ELECTRIC ENGINES.

Orders From All Parts of the World—Big Mexican Project.

New York, Dec. 15.—The locomotive department of the General Electric Company has just completed a survey which shows that the company at the present time has more orders for electric locomotives on its books than at any other time since the beginning of the World War. These orders, it is said, come from all parts of the world, and indicate that a large amount of electrification projects are under way. The opinion is expressed that the "interest in steam railroad electrification has been greatly stimulated by the high prices of fuel, labor and commodities."

Domestic orders call for new engines of various types. The Baltimore & Ohio Belt Line, which was electrified by the General Electric in 1918, has ordered two 120-ton electric locomotives, while another order was received from the Sacramento Northern Railway in California for two freight locomotives to be used in heavy inter-urban freight service.

"Among foreign orders," says a statement issued by the company, "are contracts for locomotives to be installed in Spain, France, Chile, Japan and Mexico. A Mexican order, including ten 180-ton 3,000-volt direct current locomotives is the first electrification locomotive in that country. The equipment will be installed for the Mexican Railway on the Mexico City-Vera Cruz line and is expected to effect sufficient economies to pay for the entire equipment in five years."

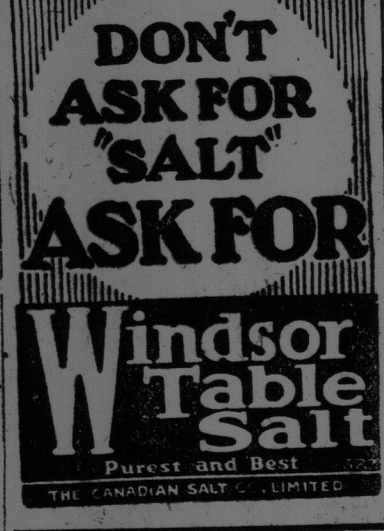
CAUGHT IN AVALANCHE.

Vancouver, Dec. 15.—Twenty-three men were swept down a mountain side in an avalanche, 38 men sleeping in a bunkhouse at Lone Jack Mine, near Chilliwack, B. C., had a narrow escape from death. One man was scolded when the contents of a soap pot on the stove was thrown over him. The rest escaped injury. The whole party reached Chilliwack after a 45-mile tramp over a mountain trail.

SHIPMENTS OF SALMON EGGS GO FROM B. C. TO JAPAN

Toronto, Dec. 15.—Huge shipments of salmon eggs are moving forward to Japan from Vancouver on almost every steamer, and it was learned here that the Japanese are making a high grade of caviar and selling it as delicious as table. In the meantime the Japanese, with the Siberian fisheries, found that they had an immense supply of fish eggs and devised the scheme of manu-



facturing caviar. Recently the demand has been so keen it has been necessary to ship salmon eggs from the coast of British Columbia to keep the Japanese curing and preserving plants busy.

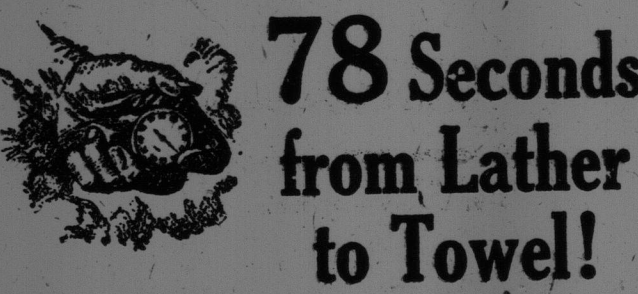

DRUG PERIL IN CARDIFF

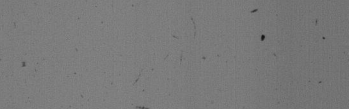
London, Nov. 21.—(By Mail)—Following on the discovery of a Chinese laundry at Cardiff of a dead Chinese and three young Englishwomen in a comatose condition, the discussion of the Cardiff Watch Committee centered on the opium dens in the city, reports the Cardiff correspondent of "The Westminster Gazette."

The chief constable, J. A. Wilson, said that the police had no powers to inspect laundries. The police in Cardiff have dealt with more cases under the dangerous drugs act than any other in Great Britain.

The Cardiff Police Museum contains more opium and other dope than any similar place in the country, it was declared. The collection of opium pipes which have been seized by the police numbers over three hundred, and hundreds of opium and dirty specimens have been destroyed.
