Considerable time was occupied with discussion of the records of the superannuation office at Toronto, with respect to the standing of members in the fund. The question was the rectifying of this record, and its publication in the printed minutes in connection with each member's name.

A motion by Rev. G. W. F. Glendenning of Moncton instructed the secretary to get the official record from the office and attend to the certifying of the same in the minutes.
