N. B. RED CROSS BUDGET \$6,000 FOR THIS YEAR

Assumed Junior Work Expenses Borne by the Head Office

REPORTS ARE GIVEN AT MEETING WERE

Hospital Supplies Are Chief Item in Expenditures for Year.

Assuming the expenses of the Junior Red Cross estimated at \$5,400 would be borne by head office and that head office would maintain for the current year home nursing organization in the province, the New Brunswick Red Cross Society yesterday adopted a budget of \$6,000 for the current year.

Arrangements were made for circulating the various branches asking them to bear their share in raising this sum without which the work could not be carried on. C. B. Allan, vice-president, was in the chair in the absence of R. T. Hayes, M. L. A., president.

R. G. McInerney, recently elected treasurer, was warmly greeted and a cordial welcome was extended to Miss E. Nutter, supervisor of Women's Institutes, who spoke of the hearty cooperation which existed between the two organizations in sewing work and in the later extension of establishing home nursing classes.

The Budget.

The budget items were as follows: Hospital supplies, \$2,500; bulletin and annual report, \$100; salaries, \$1,500; emergency relief, \$500; rent, janitor and heat, \$300; office upkeep, stationery, supplies, etc., \$300; annual convention fund, including delegates expenses, \$100.

The report of Miss Ethel Hazen Jarvis, secretary, told of the reorganization of Plaster Rock branch, with Mrs. Norman Wright as president and Mrs. J. D. Coffin as secretary, and other activities.

Junior Red Cross.

The Junior Red Cross report showed 8,616 enrolled in 142 branches and receipts to date \$1,274. During the last two months 2,860 articles were received from the branches and 1,702 parcels and 812 sent out, as well as two news letters.

Receipts from the children totaled \$49 and the balance in the crippled fund was \$192. Expenses of the department for \$255.00 in January.

Home Nursing.

The home nursing report of Miss S. Harrington, organizer, showed 13 classes

formed in Saint John and 13 outside the city and the interest in the classes very keen.

The sewing committee report was given by Mrs. Walter Allison. The financial statement of Mr. McInerney showed expenses \$947.32, including Juniors, \$461.45; depot salaries and expenses \$195.71; annual meeting, \$88.63; emergency relief, \$25.40; campaign, \$15.75. The receipts were \$189.17.

Mrs. James F. Robertson for the bulletin committee reported the annual report would be ready in May at a cost of about \$60.

Miss V. Tremblay for the port committee reported commendation received from Ottawa for the Red Cross nursing at the port, where during the month 151 children, 16 infants and 161 women were cared for.

Correspondence read included the regrets of Dr. Murray, of Campbellton, at inability to attend and the thanks of Miss Grace Brownell, of the soldiers' work department, River Glade, for the society's assistance in selling the soldiers' work. Personal gifts of hanging baskets from the soldiers were sent to Mrs. Margaret Lawrence and Miss Jarvis.

TO RENEW REQUEST FOR HIGHER DUTY

Cape Breton Hears Desired Coal Tariff Not Allowed For in Budget.

SYDNEY, March 13.—As a result of information received to the effect that no changes as regards the tariff on foreign coal are contemplated in the federal budget for 1925, the Associated Boards of Trade of Cape Breton, at an emergency meeting today, took immediate steps towards despatching a delegation to Ottawa to once more impress on the Government the necessity of further tariff protection for Nova Scotia coal.

Telegrams of Protest

Telegrams of protest have been despatched to Premier King and to Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance, and to Nova Scotia members, and a general invitation to take part in the delegation has been sent to the Boards of Trade of the province and also to those of the mining districts of Alberta and British Columbia. It is understood that the advance guard of the delegation will leave for the federal capital Sunday night.

During the latter part of December a large delegation waited on the Prime Minister with a request that the tariff on American slack coal and anthracite must be increased to that on run of mine, that is from 14 to 35 cents per ton.

FORKE SUPPORTS ATTACK ON RATES

Progressive Leader Backs up Government Proposals in House of Commons.

OTTAWA, March 13.—Tentative support of the Government's proposal for reducing ocean rates was given in the House of Commons today by Robert Forke, Progressive leader.

"Let us make an attempt to deal with this matter, anyway," said Mr. Forke, in announcing that he would support the Government's plan to subsidize the Pictou line of steamships, at least until it was examined in committee.

"Let us have an investigation and find out what we can. Having done this, I think most members will be able to give an intelligent vote when the proper time comes."

Voices Opposition.

Members of all parties contributed to the debate this afternoon and evening. Mr. Forke was followed by Donald Sunderland, Conservative, South Oxford, in opposition to the Government's scheme. "Why subsidize another line to enter into competition with the Canadian Government Merchant Marine?" he queried. He advised the Government, in view of its large railway obligations, to go very slowly before involving the country in more experiments.

Strong support of the proposal came from Hon. G. P. Graham, Minister of Railways and Canals, who declared that for 15 years Government had wrestled with the ocean rate problem, which this Government was now making a serious attempt to solve.

TO TRY NEW FUEL

Russian Engineer Will Test Petroleum in Submarine Chaser.

PARIS, March 13.—The Russian engineer, M. Makhotin, who is the inventor of a substitute for petroleum as a source of motive power and recently presented his French patent rights to the Government of this country, has been directed by

the Minister of Marine to make experiments with his new fuel in a submarine chaser.

The experiments are to be made at Cherbourg, the vessel to be used being one hitherto using crude petroleum, which has been transferred to suit M. Makhotin's new process. A naval engineer officer will watch the experiments on behalf of the French Naval Department.
