## ANGLICANS MAY ERECT CHURCH

Will See Bishop About East Saint John Project

Annual Meeting of All Saints Held Last Evening—Congregation About 150.

At the first annual meeting of All Saints church, East Saint John, held last night, discussion took place about the feasibility of building a church, but it was decided to allow the matter to stand until the committee could interview Bishop Richardson.

It was shown that the first parish meeting and the first service and Sunday school session were held in June, 1924, at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Woodroffe. Since that date 61 services have been held with an average attendance of 48.

## ALFRED RUBIN IS SEEKING DISCHARGE

Takes Matter Growing Out of Liquor Transaction, to County Court.

Yesterday afternoon in Chambers before County Court Judge J. A. Barry application was made by Alfred Rubin in the case of Friedman v. Rubin and Chechik for his discharge from Dingley.
