TALKED IN HER SLEEP ABOUT MRS. PARKER

Now There's a Police Court Case Over Trouble in James Jones' Home—Liquor to an Indian Much time was taken up in the police court this morning with the hearing of the case of James Jones, charged with assaulting his wife, Anne, in their home in Sheriff street on Saturday night last. The complainant said that her husband had assaulted her, and had been continually talking to her about going to Mrs. Parker's house and had forbidden her to go there. On Friday night last, she said, she went to bed and in her sleep said something about Mrs. Parker and her husband heard it. The next morning he packed his trunk and left the house, leaving her with three small children.

On Saturday night he returned and according to Mrs. Jones testimony they had some words and she said she threw a poker at him; that he then caught hold of her and assaulted her, after which he left the house. She said that he was suffering from nervousness and that he had been under a doctor's care for some time. Her father and Mrs. George Evans told of seeing the assault committed, and Mrs. Parker also gave evidence. The defendant went on the stand and said that his wife was the cause of all the trouble. He worked hard to support his family but life had been "a regular hell" for him. He was in a nervous condition and it was decided to adjourn the case until 2 o'clock this afternoon so that he may be examined by a doctor. E. S. Ritchie appeared for the defendant. Bernard Barry, Stephen McKay and John Smith were each fined \$5.00 and two months in jail on the charge of drunkenness. Louis Morris, an Indian, arrested on the charge of drunkenness, told the court that he had secured the liquor from a man named Langley who bought a restaurant in King Square and also in McGuire's bar in Union street. Both men were summoned for the charge of drunkenness. The case was allowed to stand over until 2 o'clock.
