Kiev Verdict Absolute

Kiev, Russia, Dec. 10.—The time limit for an appeal against the verdict acquittal in the recent sensational trial of Mendel Bellas, expired today. The charge was murdering Andrew Yushinsky for purposes of "blood ritual." The law allows fifteen days in which to appeal after the promulgation of the verdict, and as the public prosecutor did not take advantage of this, the judgment became absolute automatically.

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
