LET'S HAVE FAIR PLAY.

Although nothing has yet been officially announced it is practically understood that the New Brunswick be in about the proportion as has been allowed this province on other occa sions. This is altogether unfair to the province, and such conduct on the part of the government will, if continued considerably dampen the military spirit

For the coronation contingent, out o twenty-one officers to be chosen from Canada, only four will be taken from the maritime provinces. Of these Nove Scotla furnishes two, Prince Edward Island one-all it is entitled to-and New Brunswick one, because it cannot very well give less. This proportion is unfair. Nova Scotia may be a larger military district on account of the per manent corps stationed there, but in either New Brunswick or P. E. Island.

When recruiting for the first contingent to Africa was commenced, the applicants for positions on the company from New Brunswick appeared in greater numbers proportionately than in any other province. Since then men have gone from here in scores to serve either in Africa, in garrison at Police, and others are ready to go at any time. In the formation of the first contingent three officers went from New Brunswick, but as one of these epresented the permanent force he should not be considered as a repreentative of the provincial militia. This left only two actually chosen from the militia here, and two officers went from Prince Edward Iisland, the smalles district in Canada.

Some of the earnest workers responded not to be defeated, so worked late in order to make up the deficiency, and before the ship sailed each was presented with a well filled bag. They seemed very thankful and gave three cheers for the ladies of the Seamen's Mission. We felt that this little act of kindness was due to the boys, as they appeared to us as deserving persons of good bringing up, but wishing to see more of the world, and were probably out on their first adventure.
