FEDERATION OF SOUTH AFRICA

Most Unfortunate Step Yet Taken in That Direction.

Lord Selborne Prepares a Memorandum on the Subject—Historic Causes of Disunion.

The most important step which has yet been taken in regard to the Federation of the different parts of South Africa is represented by the publication as a state paper of a memorandum on the subject, drawn up by Lord Selborne at the request of the Government of the Cape Colony, and now sent from Cape Town, as follows:—

An important official pamphlet has been issued bearing on the question of South African Federation. It includes an exhaustive memorandum, edited by Lord Selborne, reciting the historic causes of disunion in South Africa and dealing with the evil effects of the existing system of five disconnected governments, with the consequent danger of conflicts of policy in dealing with the most vital political and economic problems.

The memorandum asserts that the state of affairs is such that the political position of the country as a whole must, within the present year, be deliberately discussed between all the British South African Governments.

In November last Sir Walter Hely Hutchinson received a request from Dr. Jameson and other ministers, that in view of the multiplicity of problems which demanded joint consideration and action on the part of the several colonies, Lord Selborne should be invited to review the general situation in order to give the people of South Africa an opportunity of expressing their views regarding federation.

The governments of Natal, Orange River Colony, and the Transvaal endorsed the invitation, and thereupon Lord Selborne, assisted by certain experts, whose identity has not been revealed, drafted the comprehensive note which has now been published.

POSITION OF DELAGOA BAY.

The memorandum conveys the impression, inter alia, that unless it is necessary by the position of Delagoa Bay, which is reaping inordinate railway and other advantages ruinously affecting the British ports, and the idea is that a consolidation of the railway and other British interests terminating in that state of things, though with scrupulous fairness to our ally Portugal, becomes increasingly pressing.

General Botha and his government point out that the memorandum was drawn up before they took office. While cordially approving of the memorandum, they dissent from what is said in the document regarding Delagoa Bay, declaring that their attitude towards the Portuguese will always be sincerely friendly.

Lord Selborne strongly deprecates regarding federation. The Colonies, it is pointed out, possess full self-government, but South Africa as a whole does not possess it, because there are constant inter-colonial divergencies which necessitate the intervention of the High Commissioner, who is controlled by the Imperial Government. Consequently, in extreme cases, the ultimate authority in the strictly internal affairs of South Africa is the Imperial Parliament.

South Africa, the memorandum adds, can only be wisely and successfully governed by a government responsible to a parliament representing the whole of South Africa.

As an instance of the unity of feeling upon this question the Times con-

respondent notes that "while the original request for some statement of the kind came from Dr. Jameson and his colleagues, the motion for its publication came from Mr. Melan, a prominent member of the Cape Opposition."

SOME DIFFICULTIES OF THE PREMIER.

The same correspondent says in regard to those portions of the memorandum dealing with native and labor questions: "While self-government is regarded as a farce till South Africa assumes the duty of maintaining a single adequate police force, the existence of five separate native departments and policies is shown to be fatal to a solution of the larger problem of a sound native administration."

Lord Selborne no longer thinks that railway union can precede political union. "The difficulties of South Africa," he is now convinced, are interdependent and must be faced as a whole. In conclusion, the High Commissioner points out that decision for or against union cannot be postponed. Railway quarrels are only in abeyance for the moment, thanks to the forbearance of the Cape and Natal during the transition of the new colonies to self-governing institutions. Within a few months another conference must meet and a definite step must be taken one way or the other. Meanwhile, political union, which is one of those few matters upon which every government must take every opposition into its confidence without reserve, will do more than anything else to break down the present racial barrier and to merge two strong peoples into a single South African nation."

WOMAN'S SKETCH DELIGHTS QUEEN

Alexandra Gives a Sitting to Mile. d'Epina, a Young French Artist

LONDON, July 22.—Queen Alexandra, who delights helping young artists, utilized some of the freedom from social engagements caused by the slight cold from which she has suffered during the last week to give a sitting to Mile. Marie d'Epina, a clever French artist, whose exhibition at the Fine Art Society was honored by a visit from King Edward the other day.

Her Majesty had promised to sit for Mile. d'Epina if possible, but there seemed little chance of a free morning and the young artist was preparing to return to Paris when a summons came from Buckingham Palace, requesting her to go there at once. The portrait, a head in red chalk, was completed in three hours, the Queen sitting before and after lunch.

Mile. d'Epina's sketch shows the face of the royal artist, and the artist utilized some of the freedom from social engagements caused by the slight cold from which she has suffered during the last week to give a sitting to Mile. MAY BE THE BONES OF POCAHONTAS

Indian Woman's Skeleton Dug Up About Where She Was Buried.

LONDON, July 22.—The afternoon Star says a skeleton has been discovered at Gravesend at a spot which in olden times was a burial ground. The bones were dug up by builders' men. One of them knowing the legend of the place sang out: "Here's Pocahontas at last."

The skull has been examined by an expert who declares it to be that of an Indian woman.

The rector of Gravesend says that the theory that these are the remains of Pocahontas is quite consistent with the well authenticated facts of history. Historians have long agreed as to the spot of ground where they were buried, but the exact spot has not been known.
