THE AVERAGE WOMAN LEADS A HAPPY LIFE.

It is usual with the world to ignore the average woman, for she is only another word for the commonplace. We don't notice the commonplace. We do not find stories down there that all the first essential of the novel is, that it should be novel, and the chief charac-teristic of a successful play is that it should be unusual—in its tragedy or in its humor. These have been paral-lels in life of a surety, but not in the average life.

The delightful heroine of your novel with her vivacity, her rough smile, and her April mood, is not average. She is above the average, just as the sordid, uncombed woman of the city slums is below. The average woman stands between, and possesses traits that can be put into print, they are so definite.

DOMESTIC WOMEN.

To begin with, she is domestic. It is nice to reflect in these days, when we have landed the "bachelor girl" on to a pedestal, that the majority of women marry and have children. There is no getting past this. The census figures show that the average woman still thinks her vocation is to be found around her own and her husband's home.

The searchlight of publicity never has found her out. No glare of approbation has reached her ears. Home is the scene of all her triumphs and all her failures, and she views life through a lens which magnifies ex-penditure which she does not meet and wrestle with and conquer—and she neither starves nor goes naked in or-der to meet income meet expenses. She simply manages closely and watchfully and if at first her judg-ment is not good it is bound to de-velop under the daily gymnastics it is forced to undergo.

Her three children will always look tidy. She will lavish a fond affec-tion on them—will probably "spoil" them—will be a little and know that it is clean and well made because I have attended to it myself. I do all my own work, but I have no servant to pester me. I take care of my own chil-dren, and I know that they are not beaten, or abused, or frightened, or taught things which they should not know. My husband is not rich, but he is free from the temptations that as-sail the rich man. Every night he is at home with me and the children. He and I have had to save and go with-out things, and this has drawn us nearer together.

Her eyes grow tender and she laugh-ed a little whimsically as she added slowly: "Yes, it is really worth while to be just an average woman."
