Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead, at the rate of \$10 per acre. Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may file a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$2000.

GREEK FLAG AGAIN

HOISTED OVER CANADA

Millia Powerless—Cons's Want Guarantee That It Will Not Occur Again.

CANEA, Island of Crete, Aug. 20—

In the armed Canea, the largest city of Crete, was today hoisted the Greek flag in the presence of a squadron of militia who were powerless to prevent the proceedings. A conflict was averted through the intervention of the Metropolitan, who begged the officer to confine the soldiers to their barracks.

The consuls of the powers have demanded that the government of Crete give a written guarantee that the Greek flag will not be hoisted after the departure of the international squadron. The government replied it will do so when order has been restored at Canea.

EMPRESS MAKES ONE OF FASTEST TRIPS ON RECORD

QUEBEC, Aug. 19.—The C. P. R. steamship Empress of Ireland arrived in port at 7:45 this evening, after making one of the fastest trips she has ever made. She would have broken the record had it not been for the delay at quarantine, due to the breaking out of two cases of measles and one of chicken-pox, in the steerage, during the voyage, necessitating the examination of the 735 steerage passengers. The Empress brought in addition 315 first class and 317 second, a total of 1327 passengers. Among them were Hon. G. P. Graham, Hon. A. J. Hanna, of the Ontario Cabinet, and a large number of delegates to the meeting of the British Association to be held in Winnipeg, including Sir J. J. Thompson, of Cambridge, president; Sir John W. Moore, of Dublin; Prof. Marchant, of Liverpool; Prof. McWenney, of Dublin; Dr. Otto Hahn, of Berlin; and Prof. Hardman, of Liverpool, secretary. Sir Sanford Fleming was also on board, completing his forty-sixth trip across the Atlantic. The passengers immediately boarded a special train and are due in Montreal at an early hour on Friday morning.

MANY TESTIFY AT VAN BUREN

VAN BUREN, Me., Aug. 19.—At the session of the international waterways commission held here today, several witnesses were examined. The session, however, was not productive of any new evidence.

V. C. Johnson, president of the Madawaska Log Driving Company, was the first called. He told about the operations at the logging camps of darning companies. He also told of the logs now in the river between Van Buren and Grand Falls to Edmonston. A number of the employees of the St. John Lumber Company then told of the operations at the logging camps. V. The animal, which had evidently gone mad by reason of the flies, knocked the farmer down and drove him away with her hoofs, when a neighbor passed on the road and saw what was going on and drove the brute back to the field. Archibald was badly crushed about the chest, and after lingering until midnight he passed away. He was over seventy years of age.

CAMPBELL'S FIGHT FOR ANCIENT CASTLE

Duke of Argyll, Head of the Clan, Enters Claim Against Kinsman.

EDINBURGH, Aug. 19.—A remarkable action, in which the Duke of Argyll seeks to prove that the castle of Dunstaffnage, an eyrie, belongs to him, was sent for trial by Lord Johnston in the court of session, Edinburgh, yesterday. The castle is at present in possession of Angus John Campbell. The Duke of Argyll, who is proprietor of the lands of Lorne, states that from a very early date the castle was a royal residence and fortress, but was conveyed to him when his family acquired the barony of Lorne from the Stuarts in 1470, the castle being then mentioned as the principal messuage or mansion house of the barony.

In 1602 Archibald, second earl of Argyll, granted in fee to his kinsman, Alexander Campbell Kere, and his male heirs the lands of Peacockstone in Lorne, and the terms of the charter included the safekeeping and maintenance of the grantor's castle of Dunstaffnage.

Up to the middle of the seventeenth century the proprietor of these lands was frequently designated as captain of the castle. The duke cites a charter of 1607, and avers that Mr. Campbell and his predecessors have failed to maintain and upkeep the castle, with the result that it has fallen into a ruinous condition.

Mr. Campbell claims that he and his ancestors have been hereditary captains of Dunstaffnage since 1436.

He claims that Dunstaffnage Castle has been occupied for centuries by his ancestors as the manor house of his arms and initials, and his castle was treated as the manor house of Dunstaffnage when the estate was created in 1590.

In Mr. Campbell's statement of facts he quotes a letter from Major General John Campbell to Neil Campbell, the twelfth captain of Dunstaffnage, dated August 1, 1746. In it John Campbell desires to know how many men were in garrison "at your house."
