

## LATER FROM EUROPE.

### DEATH OF GEN. HAVELLOCK—MORE SEVERE FIGHTING.

The Europa arrived on Sunday morning. She brings later news from India. Gen. Havelock died Nov. 25th, of dysentery.

The British under Gen. Windham had been defeated by the mutineers near Cawnpore, in which the 6th Regt. was seriously cut up. Sir Colin Campbell hearing of this disaster quickly moved on the 7th Dec. and came up with the mutineers, and totally defeated them, capturing 16 guns, an immense quantity of ammunition, and all their baggage. Rachel, the actress, is dead.

### ARRIVAL OF THE CANADA AT HALIFAX.

ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE THE EMPEROR OF FRANCE ON GOING TO THE OPERA! SIXTY PERSONS WOUNDED AND FIVE KILLED.

### MONEY MARKET MUCH EASIER! LEVIATHAN NEARLY LAUNCHED! MARKETS, SHIP NEWS, ETC.

Halifax, January 28, 1858.

Canada left Liverpool at 10.20 a.m., on the 16th, called at Cork at 11 a.m. on Sunday, 17th, took in mail and 65 passengers of disabled Steamship, and proceeded about noon same day; arrived at Halifax at 1.50 p.m. on Thursday, 24th.

Canada reports sailing vessels; on 16th American ship *Saragat*, bound out; British ship *Sea Snake* and steamship *Prize*, bound in.

Canada three over despatch about 90 miles off Cape Sable—did not get away.

Fulton sailed from Southampton for New York on the 15th.

The Agent of the Associated Press is indebted to A. H. Holley, one of Ariel's passengers, who came in the *Canada*, for the following particulars relative to that disaster.

"Ariel, with 50 passengers, mails, and heavy freight, left Bremen on Dec. 27th, and comes on the 31st. Experienced strong westerly gales which gradually increased until January 6th, when at 9 p.m., in lat 50° N. lon. 29° W. broke starboard shaft just outside ship. Hove to under day and storm sail till morning. On 7th found port wheel could be worked. Ship was then put about East at 8 a.m. 8-tipped several tremendous seas and on 8th at 3 p.m. was again laid to till morning of 9th; succeeded in slighting Cape Clear on morning of the 14th, and reached Queenstown about noon of next day.

Ship *Orford*, of Freeport, Maine, from Legation for Boston, was abandoned at sea in November, in a leaky condition. Captain and crew were picked up and taken to Gibraltar by American ship *Mary* and *Martha*.

### THE LEVIATHAN.

The *Leviathan* had been pushed to within half a dozen feet of the extremity of the launching ways. She would remain in that position until the prevailing spring tides were over, when she would be pushed off the ways, and so await the high tides at the end of January to float her.

Reform meeting were being extensively held both in London and Province. Chartist were taking part in them.

Cad. Hughes proposed to Major General for gallant defence at Lucknow.

On 14th Bank of England reduced its rate of discount to five per cent, being lowest point touched for 15 months. Further reduction anticipated in a week or two discount houses reduced rates of allowance at call from 4.2 to 3.2 per cent. Joint stock bank reduced rate for deposit to 3; action of bank imparted stimulus to stock market.

FRANCE.—Despatch to Times, dated evening of 14th, says—Barrages fired at this evening at half past 9, while entering Italian opera on Rue Lepelletier. Some persons in the streets were wounded. Emperor showed himself to people at the doors of the opera house, received with enthusiastic cheering. He remained till the end of the opera on return at midnight was hailed by enthusiastic cheers of immense number who were waiting for him in the streets.

Munition of 10th Regt.—On their Majesties a rising at night explosions coming from the hall projectors were heard, considerable number of persons who were stationed before theatre, including some soldiers of the escort, were wounded, two of them mortally; the General of Emperor was pierced by projectile, and General Roguet, aide de camp of Emperor, was slightly wounded in the neck; two footmen were also wounded. One of the horses in Emperor's carriage was killed, and the carriage broken by projectiles.

Paris, Friday Evening.—Four Italians, amongst whom are Counts Orsini and Pierre, have been arrested; many other arrests made. There are 50 persons dead, and 50 or 60 wounded by the explosion.

Paris, Saturday Morning.—In addition to foregoing particulars, it is ascertained that five minutes before the attempt, M. Pierre had arrested close to the opera on exit of 1852, who had removed to Paris under a false name. On his person was found a revolver, and the carriage broken by projectiles.

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
