Sermon by Charles T. Russell, Pastor Brooklyn Tabernacle
*Did We Give Thanks?
To Whom Did We Do So?*

Oklahoma City, Nov. 27.—Pastor Russell of Brooklyn Tabernacle ad-
dressed large audiences here twice

"O give thanks unto the Lord, for

for ever."—Psalm civ. 1.
